College takes new name

The oldest and largest college at the University has a new name. The name has been changed from College of Liberal Arts to College of Arts and Sciences to help persons outside the University gain a better understanding of the role of the natural and social sciences at the University.

"This is in accord with standard practice now across the country for liberal arts colleges," explains Dean John Baldwin. "It's slightly more accurate, although we'll have the same programs and the same curricula."

Established as the College of Letters in 1893, the college has been renamed several times in its history. The name was changed to College of Literature, Science and the Arts in 1900, and in 1932 the curriculum was reorganized into the College of Literature, Languages and the Arts and College of Social Sciences. The name College of Liberal Arts was adopted in 1942.
