

X-country ski tours set

The Eugene Parks and Recreation Department's Outdoor Program has openings in three overnight cross-country ski tours in February and March.

The first overnight, Feb. 5-6, is to Odell Butte. The three-mile trip is good for beginners but requires some previous cross-country skiing experience. Fee for the trip is \$12.

A three-day tour of Waldo Lake will explore seldom visited areas. The skiing is not difficult; however participants should be able to ski 10 miles a day and have done some winter camping prior to the trip. The tour is scheduled for March 4-6 and costs \$18.

A trip to the top of McKenzie Pass will leave Eugene March 12 and return the next day. The tour is of moderate difficulty in unpredictable weather. Participants should be comfortable skiing with

a 30-pound pack and should have done some winter camping. The trip is excellent for photography. The fee is \$12.

Pre-registration is required for all the trips at the Parks and Recreation office, 858 Pearl St., 4th floor. Fees for all trips include transportation and insurance.

Swiss exhibit maps at OMSI

A traveling exhibit on "Cartography in Switzerland" will be on display at the Southwest Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (SWOMSI) through Feb. 19.

Sponsored by the Embassy of Switzerland and the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich, the exhibit outlines Switzerland's contribution to the field of map-making. It includes discussion of the historic development of Swiss cartography along with special maps from the 16th through 18th centuries.

SWOMSI is located at Fifth Avenue and Willamette Street. Museum hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. Admission to the museum is 75 cents for adults, 50 cents for students (6-17), 25 cents for persons under 6 and over 65. SWOMSI members are admitted free.

Museum shows artifacts

Artifacts from one of the oldest archaeological sites in the Willamette Valley are now on display in a new exhibit at the University Museum of Natural History.

The exhibit features artifacts and photographs collected last summer from an excavation near Salem.

The Salem site, discovered next to a highway interchange, is thought to be one of the oldest archaeological sites in the state, says L. R. Kittleman, director of the museum.

The site was excavated through a cooperative program between the museum and the State Highway Division. Under the direction of museum archaeologist Richard Pettigrew, researchers uncovered a variety of stone artifacts, including projectile points, scrapers, engravers, and a stone mortar.

"Though analysis is still in progress, early results suggest that the habitation site may have been in use as early as 8,000 years ago, and that it was used until about 2,000 years ago," Kittleman said.

Data from the excavation will be on display at the museum through February.

The Museum of Natural History, located within the University's Science Complex, is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays and from 1 to 4:30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

Debate on evolution set

A creation-evolution debate and seminar featuring Duane Gish, associate director of the Institute for Creation Research (ICR) in San Diego, will be held at the University Thursday and Friday. The two-day event is sponsored by the University's Creation Study Forum.

Gish will debate Arthur Boucot, Oregon State University professor of geology at 7 p.m. Thursday on "The Fossil Record Supports the Evolution of Man," Friday at 7 p.m. Both debates will be held in the EMU ballroom.

Gish will present two lectures Friday, both in the EMU ballroom. He will speak on "The Origin of Life," at 10 a.m. and will give a lecture on "Alleged Evolutionary Mechanisms" at 2 p.m.

The ICR conducts studies in scientific creation and the development of a coherent system of creationist interpretation and its application in all fields. Natural science and origins are viewed by members of the Institute as the

result of the design of an intelligent creator, rather than the result of the inherent properties of matter.

Tickets, at \$3 for the entire debate and seminar, may be purchased in advance at the EMU main desk or at the Orchard Street Church, 1598 Orchard St. They may also be purchased at the door.

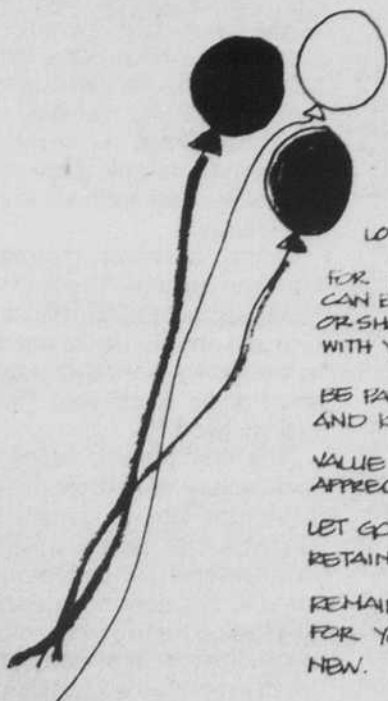
