

Radical sheriff may do time

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Richard Hongisto, San Francisco's "flower power" sheriff, may again be donning inmate's garb — this time against his will.

Shortly after taking office in 1972, Hongisto sought to dramatize the need for more jail funds by wearing the tattered uniform of a prisoner.

Re-elected in 1975, the 39-year-old former policeman also has staged jailhouse rock concerts, approved long hair and beards for his deputies, sported a peace symbol on his badge, described his own jail as "disgusting as hell" and offered to rent "rooms" at the jail for \$10 a night to expose the public to prison conditions.

On Monday, a Superior Court judge sentenced the sheriff and his chief assistant to five days in jail and fined them \$500 for failing to carry out the eviction of elderly tenants at a low-rent hotel.

Hongisto, a bachelor who concedes he may be something of a "radical swinger," oversees a 320-member department. He points with pride to his new parole, job placement, rehabilitation, medical and alcoholism programs for inmates and new training for deputies.

The sheriff, however, has been criticized for lax security in the city jails, poor communication with his staff and failure to improve the jail conditions he says he deplores.

Hongisto was easily re-elected with the same coalition of youthful, gay and minority voters attracted by his liberal stand on law enforcement issues. A practitioner of transcendental meditation, he dismisses more hard-line officials as "hawks" and

once called on judges to "earn their fat salaries by working full days."

Execution of the contempt-of-court sentence was held up until Jan. 21 to allow attorneys for Hongisto and Undersheriff James Denman time to appeal. The lawyers said they would.

"Going to jail is a small price to pay," declared Hongisto after the sentencing.

During last month's week-long trial, he vowed to run the department from a jail cell if necessary.

He was particularly irked by Judge John Benson's ruling that he be confined in San Mateo County Jail to prevent reprisals from city inmates.

"I'd be far safer in my own jail, because my own staff would make sure nothing would happen to me," said Hongisto.

San Mateo County Sheriff Jon McDonald said Hongisto and Denman would be housed in the safest part of his jail. "We've never had a sheriff before," McDonald said.

The sheriff's department was ordered last September to evict about 70 tenants of the International Hotel, a 137-year-old structure on the edge of Chinatown that new owners want to tear down. But tenants and community activists have repeatedly protested the plan. A new eviction deadline of Wednesday has been set.

Hongisto maintained his department — which administers city jails and serves court papers, leaving crime-fighting to the police department — lacked the manpower and training to carry out the eviction.

Passive solar systems, as opposed to active, Mazria explained,

do not require expensive solar panels and heat storage units, but instead rely on the design of the building to make maximum use of sunlight.

The third project is the testing of a reflector-collector combination to optimize use of available sunlight in an active (solar panel) system during different seasons. The project involves the use of cheap reflective materials such as aluminum foil to reflect sunlight onto the panel in conjunction with various panel tilt angles corresponding to the sun's position during different seasons.

primary education.

John Richardson, assistant to the chancellor says, "It's too early to tell" where the priorities will go. Richardson says the State Board of Higher Education has asked the Legislature for \$330,133,571 to fund State System of Higher Education schools. But the governor has recommended approximately a \$28,739,476 decrease in this figure. The board's asking figure is up 20 million dollars over the

1975-77 figure, to allow for inflationary factors.

In the light of decreasing enrollment and the growing deficit at the University, Pres. William Boyd has expressed his concern over the matter in general.

In a Corvallis Gazette-Times article on Dec. 17, Boyd was quoted as saying, "Higher education is underfunded, and has deteriorated in quality in recent years. It hasn't kept pace with the impact of inflation."
