Games workshops offered

Don Morris, an author and physical education professor at Montana State University who is a leading advocate of the use of games in education, will direct workshops at the University Friday and Saturday on "How to Change the Games Children Play."

The workshops are designed primarily for physical educators, recreation leaders, elementary classroom teachers, teachers of exceptional children, educational psychologists and curriculum specialists. However, any interested person is eligible to register.

The Friday workshop will be held from 3 to 5 p.m. and 6:30 to 8 p.m. The Saturday workshop will be held from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Both workshops will be held in Gerlinger Annex.

Registration fees will be \$3 for general participation and \$21 if the workshop is taken for one college academic credit. Persons interested in registering should contact Dr. Jeanine Bennett (686-4371) in Room 125, Gerlinger.

Workshop participants will be required to have a copy of "How to Change the Games Children Play," a book by Morris which will be available at the meetings. The workshops are being sponsored jointly by the Eugene Education Association and the University's chapter of Phi Epsilon Kappa, an honorary professional association for physical education students.

KWAX to air special series

"Great Decisions '77," a series of special programs devoted to American foreign policy, will be featured on National Public Radio's (NPR) "All Things Considered" every Wednesday in February and March. "All Things Considered" is heard locally on the University's public radio station KWAX-FM, 91.1, daily at 5 p.m.

Each week, NPR correspondents will explore one of eight foreign affairs topics, ranging from the spread of deadly weapons to relations between the United States and Panama. At the end of each report, special opinion ballots will be offered to listeners for reactions to key policy questions and the results will be forwarded to members of Congress and the executive branch.

The format will mix studio and location-recorded interviews. NPR producers plan to interview more than 30 foreign policy experts, historians and political scientists during the series.

Topics to be aired during the "Great Decisions" series will be Feb. 9, The Spread of Deadly Weapons; Feb. 16, Southern Africa; Feb. 23, The Middle East; March 2, Western Europe in Transition; March 9, U.S.-Soviet Relations; March 16, China and the U.S.; March 23, Food and Population and March 30, Panama and Cuba.

Adaline Starr to present psychodrama workshop

A psychodrama workshop will be presented on campus March 5 and 6 by Adaline Starr, instructor at Northwestern Medical School in Chicago and a staff member of the Chicago Alfred Adler Institute.

Persons wishing to attend the two-day workshop should preregister through the DeBusk Memorial Center, Division of Developmental Studies at the University's College of Education.

The theme of the workshop will be "Resolving Interpersonal Conflict Through Psychodrama; the Theory and the Method." Workshop participants will create specific conflict situations which will be acted out. A descriptive brochure and workshop schedule is available at the DeBusk Memorial Center.

Music education center relocates for 11th session

The University will present its 11th annual Center for International Music Education, in Reading, England from September 1977 to June 1978, according to officials of the music school.

During the past 10 years, the program has been located in Germany. However, the advantage offered by an English-speaking country, and the wealth of musical opportunities found in the United Kingdom prompted the move.

The program is designed for those who are or will be music teachers in the public schools, colleges and private studios.

The 1977 program will include extensive travel throughout the British Isles and on the continent. Participants will study English choir tradition, and the Kodaly, Orff and other European music education systems.

Graduate students and exceptional college seniors are eligible for the program. The cost for the full year will be approximately \$2,900, plus appropriate tuition. Graduate students will be enrolled at in-state Oregon tuition fee.

Address deadline nears

The deadline for aliens residing in Oregon to file address report forms is Jan. 31 as required under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act.

Lyle Dahlin of the Immigration and Naturalization Service said the law requires every alien except those having diplomatic status and representatives of certain international organizations to file the address report during January of each year at the nearest Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office.

He said most aliens in Oregon have filed address reports already.
