

## Law prof wins post

Eugene Scoles, former dean of the University's law school, has been elected to become the 1978 national president of the Association of American Law Schools (AALS).

His election took place during the association's recent annual convention in Houston, Texas.

Scoles will serve as the organization's president-elect during the 1977 calendar year. He will begin his term as the association's highest officer in January. The association represents some 2,500 law faculty members at 130 of the nation's major law schools.

Nationally recognized for his work and legal education, Scoles joined the University of Oregon faculty as dean of the law school in 1968. He returned to full-time teaching 1974 and in November, 1975, was named the University's distinguished professor of law.

## Pianists play Thursday

Duo-pianists Alfons and Aloys Kontarsky mark the third concert of the University's Chamber Music Series.

The Kontarsky brothers will appear in Beall Concert Hall, Thurs-

day at 8 p.m. The concert is sold out, but any returned tickets will be available at 7:15 p.m. that night at the door. Admission is \$2 for students and senior citizens and \$3 general.

The Kontarskys have built a distinct music reputation on two pillars, their duo performance expertise and facility for interpreting contemporary music. They will be playing works by Mozart, Brahms, Debussy and Bartok at the concert.

## Workshop held for displaced homemakers

The problems of the displaced homemaker will be discussed at a workshop scheduled for Friday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Harris Hall, 125 East 8th Ave., in Eugene.

Sponsored by the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women, the Eugene Women's Rights Commission and the University's Center for Gerontology, the workshop will focus attention on the needs of displaced homemakers in Oregon. A displaced homemaker is an individual 35 years or older who has fulfilled a role as a homemaker and is now experiencing problems caused by the loss of a spouse through death or divorce.

Laurie Shields, national coordinator of the Alliance for Displaced Homemakers, will give the keynote address. Discussions will be led by Rep. Nancie Fadeley, D-Eugene/Springfield; Karen Alvarado, member of the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women, and Frances Scott, director of the University Center for Gerontology.

Registration for the workshop is 9 to 10 a.m. on the main floor of Harris Hall.

In addition, Shields will give a noon speech at Lane Community College Friday.

## Seminar slates Wood

Lane County Commissioner Bob Wood will be one of many speakers at a herbicide seminar taking place today at Pacific University in Forest Grove.

The day-long seminar was organized by the Western Environmental Trade Association (WETA) to "aid in the progress of separating the emotionalism from the facts" in the current debate over widespread use of herbicides.

WETA advertised the seminar as a balanced forum with representation from groups both in favor and opposed to the use of herbicides. However, WETA printed the schedule of presentations believing that representatives of the Lane County based Citizens Against Toxic Sprays (CATS) would be present to talk on the economic alternatives to chemical sprays.

After reviewing the preliminary schedule of the conference, CATS decided not to formally participate. They objected to the 15 minute limitation for their presentation.

**NASA holds Mars mission colloquium**  
"The Exploration of Mars" will be the topic of a colloquium given by Dr. Hans Mark, director of the NASA Ames Research Center at Moffett Field, Calif., Friday at 3:30 p.m. in 150 Science.  
Mark will present a non-technical report outlining the most important results obtained in the recent mission to land spacecraft on Mars. He will discuss the knowledge of atmospheric composition, seismic and volcanic activity, weather patterns, and biological activity learned from the explorations.  
Mark's discussion will also include a description of some of the tentative plans for the next steps in Mars exploration.
