Mars study reviewed

Did life exist on Mars?

One billion years ago Mars had an atmosphere as good as the
Earth's is now and plenty of water, said Dr. Hans Mark, director of
NASA's Ames Research Center in a lecture that reviewed the history,
present knowledge and future of Martian exploration.

Mark proposed a new Martian exploration project that would use
intelligence collecting technology developed during the Vietnam war to
survey Martin geology. The project would cost taxpayers \$100 million
over six years.

Mark told the nearly 150 persons attending his Friday talk the
United States could use penetrators, small cylindrical projectiles used
to count the number of trucks passing over the Ho Chi Minh trail, in Mars
exploration. The projectiles were dropped from planes and hit the
ground vertically, burying themselves to a depth of 30 feet. They were
equipped with seismographs that detected vibrations from trucks pass-
ing nearby. Thirty thousand penetrators were dropped during the
Vietnam war with a failure rate of less than one per cent.

Mark said Mars should be surveyed for rock that has a high proba-
bility of containing fossilized bacteria. The oldest fossils on Earth are
bacteria found in 2.8 billion year old rock. "I want to drop penetrators on
Mars and use them to tell us where to look for these rocks," he said.

Mark suggested sending the penetrators to Mars on a vehicle
similar to those now being produced to carry a soft lander to Venus. He
wants the United States to plant six to eighteen penetrators in the
Martian surface to compare the geological properties of Martian rock to
Earth rock containing bacterial fossils.

Mark does not propose that a lander be sent to retrieve these rocks.
"That would be irresponsible," he says. It will be at least 10 to 15 years
before a lander could be sent."

The lecture included a slide presentation of Mariner and Viking
photographs. The photographs showed evidence of water flow and dry
lake beds.

The penetrators would be dropped in areas which show evidence
of high probability of finding sedimentary rock, he said. The probes
would contain miniaturized equipment to detect seismic activity, heat
flow, magnetism and elemental composition. The information would be
beamed to an orbiter and from there to Earth.
