The University's Psychology Clinic is seeking patients for a special 12-week depression treatment program.

According to Anthony Biglan, an assistant professor of psychology who is directing the program, depressed persons interested in treatment must first take part in an assessment procedure. The procedure includes interviews and questionnaires. The program is primarily self-administered.

Treatment includes assigned reading, bi-weekly meetings with a therapist and regular telephone contacts.

There is no charge for the program. However, patients are required to pay a deposit which is refunded if they follow program guidelines by keeping appointments, records and carrying out prescribed strategies.
