

Harris retains dean slot

Robert Harris has been reappointed dean of the University's School of Architecture and Allied Art. Under a new University procedure, the job performance of University deans is reviewed every six years.

According to Paul Olum, vice president for academic affairs, the performance of deans is evaluated by faculty and student committees and administrators. In addition, performance appraisals are solicited from persons outside the University.

Harris, 41, will start another six-year term July 1 with the beginning of the next fiscal year.

3-D light show distorts space

Returning to the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (OMSI) Kendall Planetarium for the third time in two years, the Heavy Water Lightshow is showing a 3-D presentation titled "Astral Perceptions" through March 6. The show runs evenings, Thursday through Sunday, in the OMSI planetarium.

"Astral Perceptions" is an experiment in optically generated 3-D. According to John Hardham and Joan Chase, the husband-and-wife team who together make up Heavy Water Lightshow, this is the most advanced lightshow they have yet created in terms of exploring perceptual theories. Giant primal forms mix with ethereal pieces of music to produce the illusion of a trip through space. Astronomical forms converge and emerge as micro-worlds in time.

The soundtrack includes music by Tim Clark, Pink Floyd, Camel, Santana, and Jefferson Starship. After its OMSI showing, "Astral Perceptions" will go to Europe, where it opens at the Deutsches Museum in Munich in May.

Talk details kinesiology

Applied kinesiology, a new system of disease detection, will be the subject of a lecture by Terry Frank at the Amazon Community Center tonight from 7 to 9.

Frank, a chiropractor from Detroit, will describe "Body Language in Health and Disease." The lecture will cost \$3 and is sponsored by the Kundalini Research Institute Northwest of Eugene.

An all-day workshop, designed to give participants a working knowledge of kinesiology, will be conducted by Frank Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Amazon Center. The cost is \$20. Those interested may enroll at the lecture or at the workshop Saturday morning.

Sponsors of Frank's talk say applied kinesiology is a system of testing muscle reflexes which are believed to correspond to internal organs. If a certain muscle tests weakly, the corresponding organ is thought to be malfunctioning in at least one of a variety of ways.

Similarly, nutritional deficiencies, injuries and skeletal alignment are diagnosed by muscle testing. "Body language," such as one shoulder or hip being higher than another, a certain gait of walk or other symptom is believed to reveal the condition of one's internal organs, sponsors say.

Frank is in the forefront of the applied kinesiology movement, the sponsors say.
