## KOZY program to focus on neighborhood groups

Eugene's neighborhood associations will be the focus of a half-hour program to be broadcast at 6 p.m. each Tuesday through March 15 on KOZY, Cable 11.

Sam Sadler, producer of the program, said the show is aimed at strengthening neighborhood associations by informing them about what other neighborhood groups are doing.

The show, which is being produced through the facilities of the mass communications department at Lane Community College, will follow a news/interview format. The first four minutes of each show will be devoted to a quick roundup of projects being undertaken, positions adopted and agenda items for neighborhood meetings throughout the city. Bruno Cohen will be the anchor person.

This section of the show will be followed by a film report about a current neighborhood project. Interviews with two or three persons involved in the project will be included.

Beth Campbell and Ruth Miller, neighborhood liaisons for the city, will be interviewed on the first show. They will outline the history of the neighborhood organizations and the role they are playing now.

## Hart gets grant to teach seminar

Thomas Hart, professor of romance languages, will teach a seminar for college teachers this summer with a \$40,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Twelve faculty members from undergraduate or two-year colleges will be chosen from among applicants and given a \$2,000 stipend to attend the seminar in Spanish Literature June 20 through Aug. 12.

The seminar is one of 106 that will be held at universities across the country with government funding.

Hart says the grant enables college teachers from schools without doctoral programs a chance to do specialized research using the extensive facilities not available in the smaller colleges they come from.

## Public briefing relays changes for BPA plans

A public briefing titled "Proposed Changes for Bonneville Power Administration (BPA)" is scheduled for 8 p.m. Tuesday, sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Central Lane County.

The meeting will feature a panel discussion with Sen. George Wingard, R-Eugene, explaining Gov. Bob Straub's proposals for BPA. Other panel members will be Ladd Sutton, Eugene district office manager of BPA, and Chris Attneave, a member of the Eugene Future Power Committee. Sutton will give background on the Bonneville Act and will explain the preference clause. Attneave will outline the Oregon Environmental Council's proposals.

The meeting will be at the Westminster Presbyterian Church on Coburg Road.

## Health grants available

Project support for dissertation research concerning health services delivery problems is available from the National Center for Health Services Research. The program is designed to encourage small-scale research projects and develop a group of sophisticated new health services researchers.

Students enrolled in a doctoral degree program in social, medical, management or health sciences who will be conducting dissertation research on an aspect of health care delivery and who will have been advanced to candidacy by the time of the grant award are eligible to apply.

The committee is reviewing data on existing airports and geographic distribution of aircraft owners and pilots. They also plan to discuss preliminary results of an aircraft owners' survey.

The committee is advising the Department of Transportation, which is trying to determine the need for, and feasibility of, establishing a new general aviation airport to serve residents of the metropolitan area.
