The history series begins on KWAX at 2:30 p.m. today with the airing of segment one. The series will be continued on KLCC at 7 p.m. and repeated at 10 a.m. Wednesday. Segment three will be aired on KWAX at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday and repeated on KLCC at 7 p.m.
