Saturday and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day the Student Dance Board of the dance department will be sponsoring two dance workshops at the University conducted by Karen Friend, graduate student and teaching assistant in the dance department.

The Saturday workshop will be "Teaching Dance Technique" and the Sunday workshop will be "Movement and Dance Activities for the Academic Classroom." Both workshops will be held in Room 353, Gerlinger Annex.

University students and faculty will be admitted to the workshops free of charge. There will be a \$6.50 workshop fee per day for non-University participants.

Participants may register for either or both of these workshops. Elementary school teachers would be especially interested in the Sunday workshop, which will include discussion, active participation and printed materials.

Divorce interviews begin

The University's Psychology Clinic is now beginning assessment interviews for placement in self-help and group treatment programs for persons who are ex-

periencing the problems of recent divorce or separation.

The treatment programs, scheduled to begin in March, are offered in conjunction with a research project led by Stephen Johnson, associate professor of psychology, and Peter Alevizos, project director.

The programs are designed to help persons cope with separation and living as single persons. Registration will be limited. Participants will be required to make a contingency deposit, which will be refunded to those who complete all requirements.

Office lists tax exemptions for vet benefits recipients

As the nation's taxpayers ponder the new federal income tax returns, the Veterans Administration (VA) reminds recipients of veterans benefits that these payments generally are exempt from taxation.

Major tax-exempt VA benefits are compensation, pension and educational assistance. The latter includes subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees. These monthly payments need not be reported on federal income tax returns, it was noted.

Also exempt are VA grants to military service-disabled veterans for specially adapted homes and automobiles and clothing allowances paid to service-disabled veterans whose usage of prosthetic or orthopedic appliances result in undue wear and tear on clothing.

Dividends and proceeds from government life insurance policies are exempt from federal income tax, but the proceeds are subject to federal estate tax, a VA spokesman explained.

Interest accrued on government life insurance dividends left on deposit or credit with the VA is not exempt and must be reported on federal income tax returns, the spokesman added.

Interiors lecture slated

Arthur Hawn, assistant professor of interior architecture at the University, will speak on "Oregon Interiors of the Victorian Age" at 4:30 p.m. Friday in Room 177 Lawrence.

His talk, part of a free weekly series sponsored by the School of Architecture and Allied Arts, will contain descriptions of residential interiors during the 1870s, 1880s and 1890s and will provide a more detailed discussion on the interior architecture of Two Portland houses of the Victorian period.

Admission to the talk is free and the public is invited to attend. Hawn, a member of the faculty since 1967, holds bachelors and masters degrees in fine arts and interior design from Washington State University.
