

County offices move

Several more Lane County offices are now operating in the new public service building as a result of recent moves to the structure attached to the county courthouse in Eugene.

The transportation department director and administrative offices, county surveyor and planning section are now located on the ground floor of the building near the Pearl Street entrance, across from city hall.

County citizens interested in roads for subdivisions should now contact the transportation planning office in the public service building, not the annex where they were previously located.

The new restaurant is located in the basement or concourse level of the building, near Seventh Avenue. Access to the basement level of the new structure is available through the tunnel connected to the lower level of the new parking structure located on Sixth Avenue, between Oak and Pearl Streets. Stairs off Seventh Avenue also lead to the basement level.

The new restaurant is open from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. and the general public may use the facility during those hours.

The CARES office is also operating in the new building on the plaza or second floor level. Access to the office may be across the bridge from city hall by stairway from Pearl Street, or through the courthouse at the Eighth Avenue side of the building.

Reports, maps outline proposal for new zoning

A report and map on the preliminary zoning proposal for the Lower McKenzie Subarea is now available in two county locations.

The materials are available at the Waltherville Elementary Grade School gymnasium and at the Lane County Planning Division. That office is located in the basement of the public service building, attached to the courthouse, at 125 East Eighth Ave.

The zoning proposal is intended to implement land use planning by establishing districts where certain activity may take place. The zoning will be used to regulate development within each district, but zoning is not retroactive.

The Lower McKenzie Subarea is generally from Hendricks Bridge to just east of Ben and Kay Dorris State Park, and between the north and south ridge lines.

A second series of meetings on subarea zoning will be held March 2 in Leaburg, and March 3 in Waltherville, according to Mike Nagler, Lane County planner responsible for the zoning program in the subarea.

Nomination deadline set

California Institute of Technology has announced March 21 as the deadline for receipt of nominations from universities for the Dr. Chaim Weizmann Postdoctorate Fellowships for Scientific Research. There are five to ten awards available in this competition.

Included in the fellowship is an annual stipend of \$11,000 (which may be supplemented from other sources) and reimbursement for travel costs one-way. The award may be renewed for a second year and possibly a third year in unusual circumstances.

Recipients must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents, be under 30 years of age as of Sept. 1, 1976, and be accepted or have potential acceptance of a university for postdoctoral research.

Applications will not be received from individuals, but nominations will be accepted from graduate deans of universities. Each institution is allowed to nominate one candidate. No application forms are necessary. Nomination papers should include the usual biographical and educational data, copies of undergraduate and graduate transcripts, several letters or statements of recommendation and a brief description of the plan of study of scientific research during the postdoctoral period.

Richard Higgins, a University physics professor, will speak on "Never a Dull Moment: LQO Spectroscopy of Electrons in Metals," at 3:30 p.m. today in Room 16, Science II. LQO spectroscopy looks at electrons locally in momentum space, allowing a study of the dynamics of electrons whose symmetry and spin are "labeled." Two examples will be discussed, one dealing with a magnetic moment system, and the other exploring the quantization of
