Civil rights programs set

The Student Bar Association and the American Civil Liberties Union will present a series of programs this week centered around civil rights and the Bill of Rights.

Starting the program today will be a discussion by Portland attorney Becky Yeats about the issues involved in advertising. Yeats will speak at 12:30 p.m. in 126 Law about the extent to which the media can discriminate in its choice of advertisers.

The issue is particularly topical because of recent controversy over the running of advertisements for Gallo wine in the Oregon Daily Emerald, the claim by gay groups in Eugene that the Eugene Register-Guard discriminates against gays in its classified ad section and the prohibition of an advertisement by a gay student group in a Lane County high school newspaper.

Wednesday's program will feature attorney Charles Porter discussing "Controlling Secret Police" at 12:30 p.m. in 126 Law.

Friday, at 7 p.m. in 129 Law, the film series entitled "The Bill of Rights" will be shown. All programs are free and open to the public.

Church schedules seminar

The Eugene Church of Religious Science will present a seminar on the "Phenomenon of Man" and its author, paleontologist Teilhard de Chardin, co-discoverer of Peking Man, Saturday from 1 to 5 p.m.

An audio-visual lecture program, the seminar presents the theory, research and evolutionary discoveries of Chardin, a Jesuit priest and a research scientist with the Museum of Natural History.

Torn between his inherent interest in the search for man's beginning and his spiritual obligation to Catholicism as a priest and teacher, Chardin's manuscripts were secretly held by a devoted follower who had them published a few years after Chardin's death in 1955. Gaining world-wide renown and growing in popularity internationally, the books were translated from the French and published in foreign languages.

The "Phenomenon of Man Project, Inc.," a non-profit organization, was formed by Chardin's followers.

Archaeologist talks today on ancient China

The mysterious history of ancient China may become a little clearer for University faculty and students today when a Columbia University archaeology researcher presents her research of Chinese artifacts.

Anneliese Gutkind Bulling, research associate in art history and archaeology at Columbia University, has extensively researched recent archaeological excavations and publications reporting those excavations.

She will speak and show slides, focusing on research of tombs of the Ch'in and Han Dynasties at 8 p.m. in 177 Lawrence Hall.

Bulling will discuss regional differences among tombs, the influence of various Chinese ideologies and the shapes and contents of tombs and the relationship of the contents of tombs with mourning rites and other cultural habits.

Her appearance is sponsored by the Archaeological Institute of America, according to Esther Jacobson-Leong, associate professor of art history at the University.

Several new findings have been made by researchers in China during the last few years, some of which date back nearly 2,000 years. Bulling will discuss these and others according to the art history department.
