The Lower 48 Friends, the Outdoor Program and the Survival Center will open a film series tonight dealing with Alaska wilderness issues. Tonight's films are "The Trans-Alaska Pipeline" and "Oil Spoil."

"Trans-Alaska Pipeline" is an Alyeska production documenting pipeline construction activities from Prudhoe Bay on the North Slope across three mountain ranges and hundreds of rivers to the ice-free port of Valdez on Alaska's south coast.

"Oil Spoil" is a Sierra Club film that examines society's current addiction to petroleum products.

Berger has visited China more than 26 times since 1952, and has written extensively on China's economic developments with recent articles published in the London Times.

His appearance is sponsored by the U.S.-China People's Friendship Association, the Asian Study Program and the EMU Cultural Forum.
