OMSI shows space film

Today through Saturday, the Southwest Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (SWOMSI) will be showing the film "Jupiter Odyssey — 1974."

The film recounts the 620-million mile journey of Pioneer 10 to the planet Jupiter. This was the first spacecraft to travel beyond Mars to the outer planets of the solar system. The half-hour film, put out by NASA, will be shown at 4 p.m. each of the five days. A Pioneer 10/11 full-scale model is on display at the museum.

SWOMSI is located at Fifth Avenue and Willamette Street. Admission is 75 cents for adults, 50 cents for students and 25 cents for those under six and over 65. This covers all the exhibits and the planetarium show. SWOMSI is a non-profit cultural and educational organization.

Oil geology focus of talk

John Browning, president of J.M. Browning Consultants Ltd., International Oil Operations, will present a free public lecture Thursday at 8:30 p.m. in Room 150, Geology.

Sponsored by the American Association of Petroleum Geologists as part of a Distinguished Lecture Tour, Browning will speak on "Aulacogens and Megashears: Natural Habitat for Oil and Mineral Deposits." Browning will speak to approximately 30 societies and universities during his lecture tour.

A Canadian, Browning's background is field geology and exploration. He has worked in both North and South America and served as president of Tenneco Oil and Minerals Ltd. from 1965 to 1969.

Currently president of his own consulting operation, Browning's special interests include regional policy, plate tectonics and international economic energy problems.

Objectivism series set

The Libertarian Reference Center is sponsoring a weekly series for 20 taped lectures on the principles of objectivism by Nathaniel Branden of New York.

Branden is a psychologist who worked closely with novelist Ayn Rand and was head of the Nathaniel Branden Institute in New York. His lectures cover a wide range of topics, including philosophy, psychology, political science, sexuality and aesthetics.

The first lecture, titled "What is Philosophy," will be run at 8 tonight in the Libertarian Reference Center, located in the basement of the Eugene Business College, 385 E. 11th Ave. Donations of \$1 are requested.

Businessman to speak

Businessman Harold Hirsch will speak at 7:30 Thursday night on "A Potpourri of Business Topics" at Room 146, Straub Hall. Hirsch is chair of the board of White Stag Manufacturing Co., a Portland-based sportswear firm.

Hirsch will review employment opportunities for business students and will then field questions from the audience. The talk is sponsored by Alpha Kappa Psi, an undergraduate organization of business students.

Tuition workshop slated

A workshop for students who want lower tuition is scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday in the EMU. Both ASUO lobbyist Jim Bernau and Mark Cogan, ASUO vice-president for legislative affairs, will give presentations on strategy for keeping tuition low at the University. Cogan's presentation will center on Gov. Bob Straub's tuition recommendation.

The Oregon Student Lobby (OSL) recently adopted a tuition policy which includes a six per cent decrease for resident undergraduates and no increase for resident graduates. The policy specifies a 12 per cent increase for non-resident undergraduates and a 68.5 per cent tuition jump for non-resident graduate students.

If enough students, especially

non-residents support lower tuition for out-of-state students, Bernau says the lobby may not adopt a stronger tuition statement.

"We suspect non-resident undergraduate and graduate students would like to keep tuition down," Bernau says.

Mark Cogan, ASUO state affairs vice-president, will lead the discussion.
