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areas, ensuring compliance with guidelines and statutory requirements, as well as review minor and traditionally funded areas.

Reviews completed and compliance ensured, Boyd will submit the completed ASUO recommendation for incidental fee distribution to the Oregon State Board of Higher Education.

Throughout the budgeting process, programs are evaluated on the economy of proposed costs as well as justification for student funding.

Programs are judged on the basis of student benefit and whether the program's staff or the general student community use the program. According to ASUO budget criteria, experimental learning benefits to staff members are subordinate in the analysis.

A glance through the Executive's budget shows recommended increases of 87 per

cent for Panhellenic and 65 per cent for its counterpart, Interfraternity Council. The Asian American Student Union's budget recommendation is a 57 per cent increase over last year, while the recommendation for Off-Campus Housing is nearly double last year's budget. Political Science Student Union's recommendation is up 280 per cent from last year's budget.

Budget cuts of 18 per cent were recommended for OSPIRG, while the International Education Center's recommendation is down 19 per cent from last year. The majority of the programs fared better with budget increases but two programs, the Oregon and the Students' International Meditation Society bear zero funding recommendations.

Programs and their budgets are judged on student involvement, accessibility and measurable benefits to students.

Programs serving the general student body are judged by how many students they serve. Programs directed toward specific groups are evaluated on the percentage of students they serve within that constituency and use of volunteer staffing.

Criteria for judging accessibility include staffing — holding office hours on a consistent basis, the ability of publicity to generate enthusiasm and solicitation of input from users.

Benefits of the programs are measured on the basis of service to students, quality and organization, uniqueness and whether they are achieving current goals and objectives. Measurable benefits include academic benefits, educational benefits providing out-of-classroom learning, improving the quality of life, making access to the University cheaper, and service to the University community.

Senate to discuss grading changes

Students stuck with a "P" for a class which they should have taken for credit may find relief if a proposal before the University Senate finds approval when the Senate meets today in 225 Law at 3:30 p.m.

Andrea Gellatly, president of the Student University Affairs Board, has introduced a motion which would allow professors to change a student's grade option from pass-fail to graded after the customary six-week deadline.

Gellatly and Russian professor John Beebe, are members of the Scholastic Deficiency Committee which reviews 20 to 30 cases a year where students mistakenly took a class pass-undifferentiated and want a grade listed on their record.

"Unless the student was somehow misguided by his adviser or there are some special circumstances in the case, we have no authority to change the grade even if the professor wants to," Gellatly said.

The problem arises, Gellatly says, when students transfer to another school or change majors and find they took a class pass-fail when a grade is required.

"Although the grade would more accurately reflect the student's performance in a course, we are not allowed to make the change under present conditions," Gellatly added.

Beebe says he wouldn't expect a flood of change requests in Oregon Hall if the proposal were accepted since students usually take a class pass-fail because they don't want to do the work required for a B or an A.

"Under the proposal to be discussed today a professor would have no obligation to change a grade merely because a student made the request," Beebe said.

Another motion before the Senate today suggests listings in the course catalog be made using the international 24-hour clock to avoid the confusion of a.m. and p.m. classes.

Last on the agenda is another motion by Gellatly. If time allows, she will request course evaluations be released to students.

The issue was hotly debated last year and the faculty eventually voted not to publish the reports after University Pres. William Boyd raised the question.

Gellatly says an ASUO poll of faculty reveals most of them support publishing the evaluations.
