

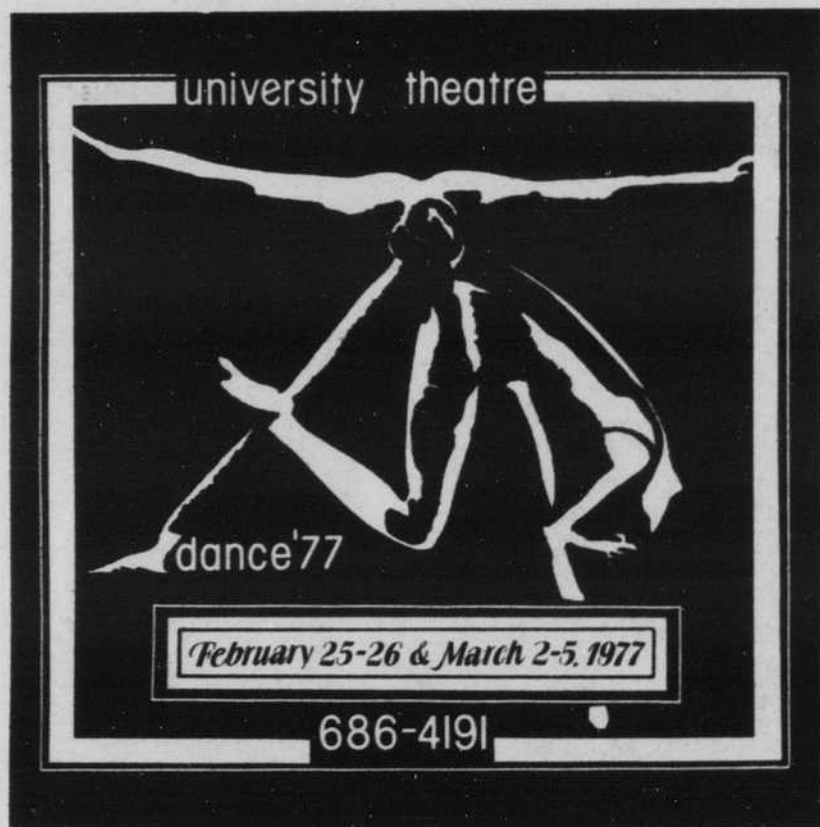
BASIC seminar slated
