

Birth control seminar covers lunaception to sterilization

A seminar on contraception, billed as "Everything You Wanted to Know About Birth Control and More", will take place Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in 180 PLC.

All contraceptive devices and methods will be displayed and discussed, from astrological birth control to the pill. Representatives of major drug companies, counselors from Planned Parenthood and Lane County Family Planning and area physicians will be on hand to make presentations and to answer questions.

Mike James, past president of the Lane County Pharmaceutical Association, said he organized the seminar to make information available to students on all means of contraceptive practice.

"Unfortunately more women seem to be interested in birth control than men and they attend something like this a lot more readily than men will," James said.

Sterilization methods for both men and women will be discussed at the day long event. Dr. Dennis Ellison will present a short talk on vasectomy, and Dr. Donald Woerner will describe female sterilization procedures in-

cluding tubal ligation. Both talks are scheduled for the afternoon.

"Doctors get lots of questions from men about vasectomy," James said. "Most men really need to have their questions answered because a lot of them are afraid a vasectomy means their testicles will fall off."

Natural birth control methods — astrological-rhythm, rhythm, lunaception, the Billings cervical mucous detection method and other non-mechanical techniques will be explained by a woman from Family Planning. James said the woman is an expert on natural methods.

"If she doesn't know the answer to a question nobody knows it," he said.

Spermicidal foams, jellies, creams, diaphragms, the pill and the IUD are scheduled to be discussed before noon on Saturday. Prophylactics, sterilization and natural methods will be presented in the afternoon.

James said he asked drug company representatives to present their products, although he knows they will be speaking from an industry point of view. While James said he expects controversy, he did not invite any women's groups to be participants.

IFC funds Whale Symposium

The Incidental Fee Committee (IFC) approved two requests for supplemental funding Wednesday night, but refused to fund a new program for the current year.

The Survival Center received a \$500 allocation from the IFC to fund a Whale Symposium. The center has already raised \$1,000 to cover the symposium's cost.

Off-Campus Housing received \$250 to cover the salary of a lobbyist at the rate of \$60 per month. The program is lobbying for three renter bills, as well as legal aid and landlord bills.

The IFC also allocated an additional \$750 to Off-Campus Housing to pay for legislative publicity and gather student support for its bills. Off-Campus Housing is

sponsoring bills that would end non-refundable deposits, provide enabling action for rent control and provide "just cause" for rent increases.

The Oregon Student Chapter of American Landscape Architects request for \$250 was turned down by the IFC. Chairer Gary Feldman said the program's two-month existence wasn't long enough for adequate evaluation, but told program members the IFC would accept a request for next year.

The IFC will act on the Women's Symposium's request for \$1,300 in matching funds next week. The symposium has already received funding from Ananda Marga (\$300), the Cultural Forum (\$400) and ASUO Executive (\$600).
