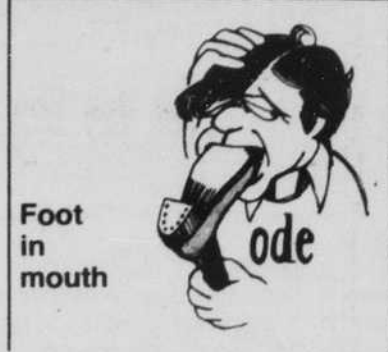
**Symphony to be filmed**

During his visit to the University, Peli also will present two talks at the Koinonia Center, 1414 Kincaid St. At 10 a.m. talk to an honors college class on "Elie Wiesel," Peli will speak on "Hassidic Studies." An 8 p.m. general talk in entitled "An Evening with Pinchas Peli."
