## OSU offers summer jobs

Applications for short-term summer employment in two Oregon State University (OSU) Extension Service youth programs are now being accepted. Deadline for applying for both programs in April 15.

Some 35 students, who have completed at least one year of college, are being sought to serve as counselors during 4-H Summer Week on the OSU campus June 13-18, according to Lois Redman, OSU Extension 4-H and youth specialist.

Another 12 young people who have finished one year of college, or who are 19 and older, will be selected to work on the 4-H student staff at the Oregon State Fair in Salem Aug. 22 to Sept. 6, reports Duane Johnson, OSU Extension 4-H and youth specialist.

## Workshop keys on 'test-taking'

A workshop in test preparation will be offered today in the Self-Development Center Thought Shop on the second floor of Emerald Hall, at 7 p.m. Anyone may attend.

The session will focus on improving the effectiveness of study in preparation for test-taking, according to Barbara Date, administrative assistant at the center.


Included in tonight's session is structuring subject matter for better memory, describing and evaluating practice procedures, memory techniques for different types of tests and language learning.

A follow-up session for those attending tonight's or a similar past meeting will be held Thursday for those who have difficulty with the process of test-taking rather than just test preparation.

Specifically, the workshop will cover strategies for controlling anxiety, developing personal compensations for high anxiety situations, and in establishing levels of comfortable intensity.

Professor Pinchas Peli, Israeli scholar-in-residence in the U.S., will speak on "The Changing Faces of Israel: Religious, Social and Cultural," at noon today in Room 167, EMU.

His address, sponsored by the Jewish Student Association-Hillel, will open, without charge, to the public.

Peli is known throughout the Jewish world as poet, philosopher, editor and lecturer. He is a former editor-in-chief of Panim-EI-Panim, a Hebrew weekly newspaper, and is active as a program editor for Israeli radio and television. A senior lecturer at Ben Gurion University, he is currently making his fourth extended visit to the U.S. as Israeli scholar-in-residence.

Peli also will present two talks at the Koinonia Center, 1414 Kincaid St. At a 10 a.m. talk to an Honors College class on "Elie Wiesel," Peli will speak on "Hasidic Studies." An 8 p.m. general talk is entitled "An Evening with Pinchas Peli."

Anne Fernald will discuss her research concerning paralinguistic features (intonations, rhythm, etc.) of mothers' speech to neonates at 3:30 p.m. today in Room 156, Straub. She conducted this research at the Max Plank Institute in Hans Papoušek's laboratory.

Her presentation is a joint psychology-linguistics colloquium.

Armando La Guardia from Portland State University will speak about the need for multi-cultural education in Oregon from 12:30 to 1:50 p.m. today in Room 342, Gilbert. Interested persons are invited to attend this class meeting.
