Repression panel today

A panel discussion on repression and resistance in Chile and Iran is scheduled today from 1:30 to 3 p.m. in the EMU.

Speakers from the Eugene Committee for a Free Chile and the Iranian Students Association will speak on the repressive regimes in these two countries and the role the United States has played in bringing these regimes to power.

They will also discuss the resistance movements in these countries and what the American people can do to support the people of Chile and Iran. The Chile speaker will also present a slide show.

Future panels will deal with such countries as Korea, Azania (South Africa), Namibia, Zimbabwe (Rhodesia), Brazil, Argentina, the Middle East, Puerto Rico and Thailand.

The panels on repression and resistance are sponsored by the Eugene Ad Hoc Committee for the Northwest Conference on the International Situation. The conference is scheduled for April 2 at the University of Washington, Seattle. For more information call 689-7062.

Music grant judging set

Judging for the annual Ruth Lorraine Close scholarship competition at the University's music school is set for Friday and Saturday. Four nationally known professional musicians will adjudicate the competition.

Auditions of the Close finalists are open to the public. The screenings will run from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1:30 to 4:15 p.m. on Friday and from 9:30 to 11:45 a.m. and 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. on Saturday. More than \$40,000 in scholarships will be awarded to music students.

Judges for the competition will be Ulysses Kay, internationally recognized composer; Mildred Dilling, frequently referred to as the First Lady of the Harp; Martial Singher, Metropolitan Opera vocalist; and Verne Reynolds, professor of horn at Eastman School of Music. All of the judges will present workshops and lectures during their visits on campus.

Singer will lecture on "What a young vocalist can anticipate in the professional world today," in Beall Concert Hall at 8 p.m. Thursday. At 1 p.m. Sunday, Dilling will give a workshop for harpists in Room 202, Music.

Tenant law topic

Landlord-tenant law will be the topic of People's Law School tonight at 7. This class will focus on the Oregon Residential Landlord-Tenant Act and will cover rights and obligations of landlords and tenants.
