Geoffrey West, from the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, will speak on "Scale and Dimension in Various Physical Phenomena Ranging from Animals to Quarks," at 3:30 p.m. today in Room 16, Science I. Covering the classical method of dimensional analysis, West's lecture is aimed at junior-level physics.

West's lecture is part of the physics department's colloquium.

Robert Agger, a former University political science professor and now a staff member on McMaster University in Canada, will discuss problems of cross-cultural research with interested graduate students and faculty members at noon today in the ninth-floor lounge of PLC.

While at the University, Agger headed a multidisciplinary research institute. He has recently directed a multinational social science research team working in Eastern and Western Europe, Canada, and the U.S.

MISCELLANEOUS

Internationally known poet Shirley Kaufman will read her poetry at 8 tonight in Room 150, Geology. The recipient of numerous international awards for her poetry and translation of Hebrew verse, Kaufman is the author of five volumes of poetry. A resident of Jerusalem, she is Roethke Visiting Professor of Poetry at the University of Washington. Her visit is sponsored by the English department, with assistance of the University Lectures Committee and the Cultural Forum.

James Watson, professor of biology at Harvard University and winner of the Nobel Prize for his discovery of the structure of genetic material (DNA), will conduct a seminar for the Institute of Molecular Biology at 4:30 p.m. today in Room 150, Geology. His lecture, "The Transformed Cell," is open to the public, free of charge.

Director of Cold Spring Harbor Biology Laboratories, Watson is also author of the popular novel "The Double Helix," and a best-selling textbook, "The Molecular Biology of the Gene."
