Voters league distributing free officials index

"They Represent You," an index of national, state and local public officials, is being distributed in the Eugene-Springfield-Junction City area this week by the League of Women Voters of Central Lane County.

The booklet was compiled by the league as a public service and is free to the public. It includes an elections schedule, a list of regular local meetings and a list of addresses for communication with public officials.

This publication can be picked up at most public buildings (libraries, city halls, county courthouse, state offices, some local banks and political party headquarters). For additional copies or information call the League of Women Voters, listed in the phone directory.

Featured in the exhibit will be the furnishings from the Osburn Hotel's well-remembered Oriental Tea Room. Admission to the museum, located at 740 W. 13th Ave., is free.

The massive hand-carved 19th century imported furniture, some with inlaid mother of pearl, scrolls and other examples of turn-of-the-century oriental influence are on exhibit together for the first time since the museum acquired the collection in 1964 from the Earley family, last owners of the Osburn.

The hotel was built in 1910 on the northwest corner of Eighth Avenue and Pearl Street in Eugene, the present site of Lane County's new Public Services Building.

The exhibit, designed and installed by the University museology class, under the instruction of Richard Paulin, director of the University Art Museum, will remain until July.

Regular visiting hours at the museum are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. The museum is closed on Friday and legal holidays.

Jazz band begins program

The University's Jazz Lab Band I will initiate their first jazz artist in residence program with the appearance of jazz trumpeter Oscar Williams this week. The residency includes a workshop and culminates in a concert Thursday.

The Jazz Lab Band I concert featuring Williams begins at 8 p.m. in the University's Beall Concert Hall. General admission is \$2 and \$1 for students.

The 20-member jazz laboratory ensemble will perform progressive big band jazz repertoire from the libraries of Woody Herman, Wayne Shorter, Stan Kenton and the California recording industry. Featured will be a specially commissioned work by jazz arranger Glen Daum of Austin, Texas.

Williams is a well-known recording artist from the San Francisco area. He has performed with jazz groups such as Ray Charles, Stan Kenton, Horace Silver and Blood, Sweat and Tears. Williams can be heard on records with James Brown, Santana, Dwain Everette and Lee Dorsey.

As part of his week-long visit, Williams will conduct a clinic on Tuesday. The workshop will begin at 12:30 p.m. in Room 202 Music. Admission is \$1.

Institutes given assistance

The National Science Foundation has selected 38 NATO Advanced Study Institutes to be held in Europe in 1977 to receive assistance in the form of travel awards for United States student participants. Approximately 80 travel participants will be assisted this year.

These institutes, most of which will be held during the summer, are intended to provide advanced instruction on highly specialized topics. This year subjects covered by the institutes include astronomy, chemistry, computer science, engineering, geology, physics, mathematics and life sciences.

Advanced graduate and post-doctoral students as well as junior-level faculty or scientists who are U.S. citizens are eligible for this assistance. All awards are made upon specific nomination of the Institute Directors, who are furnished application materials.
