Assisting individuals with the problems of divorce is the purpose of a treatment program at the University's Psychology Clinic.

Sponsored by a grant from the National Institute of Mental Health, the research project is being conducted by Stephen Johnson, University associate professor of psychology, and Peter Alevizos, research associate.

Program participants will be divided into four groups receiving different treatments. Treatments will include weekly counseling, group study from a reading guide and exercises in and out of the group.

"Getting stuck," explains Alevizos, is one of the biggest problems divorced people have. The program is aimed at helping individuals deal with the problems of divorce and channeling them through group and self help programs and back into society, says Alevizos.

Individuals between 18 and 55 who have been divorced within the past two years compose the group. Persons interested in volunteering for the program may call the program office at 686-4960.
