Papers are now being considered for presentation at the third symposium in the Pathfinders in Human Personality Series for October, 1977.

While the first two symposia in the series have celebrated the lives and works of Carl Jung and Alfred Adler, this fall the focus will be on the theory of Sigmund Freud and those of the psychoanalytic tradition.

Since the series has established a tradition of combining student presentations with scholars distinguished in the field, students are especially encouraged to submit papers for consideration. Papers will be selected on the basis of whether they are:

- In keeping with the historical perspective of the symposium and addressing theory rather than practice
- Complementary of other scheduled presentations
- Exemplary of clarity and over-all scholarship
- Appropriate for a twenty-minute to one-hour presentation

Seminar keys on job bias

A conference dealing with "Equal Opportunity in Employment and Education" is scheduled for Saturday at Lewis and Clark Law School in Portland.

The objective of the day-long conference is to acquaint people with their rights regarding discrimination in employment, to inform people of the scope and requirements of affirmative action

programs in schools and to bring together community people, lawyers, legal staff persons and students.

The conference will begin at 9 a.m. and continue until 5 p.m. and will consist of nine workshops.

Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. A \$10 fee will be charged to members of the Bar and \$2 donations will be requested from others. Child care will be available. The conference is sponsored by the Law School Chapter of the National Lawyers Guild, the Minority Law Students Association, the Women's Caucus and the LAW Student Division of the American Bar Association.

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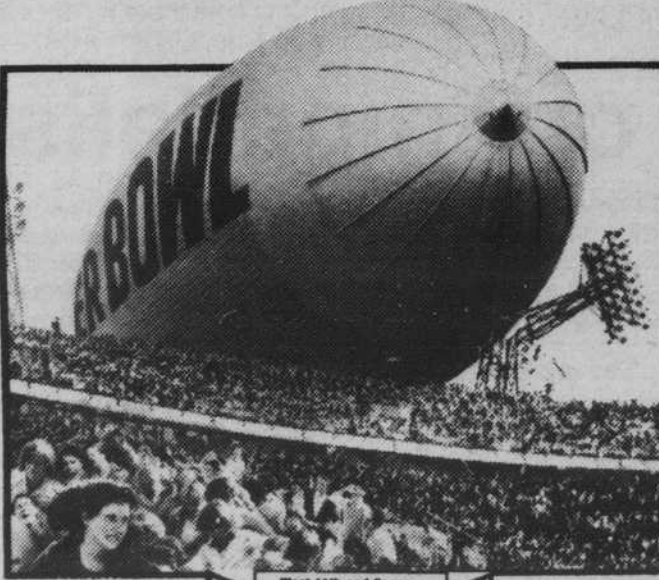
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Garden spots await dry days before planting

Lane County garden plots in Alton Baker Park have been tilled but several days of sunshine are needed before the soil will be ready for planting.

County crews completed preparing the soil Friday, but the parks office urged residents who have rented the plots to wait for drier conditions to prevent compacting the soil.

Some 200 plots have been rented to county citizens this year and just under 30 plots are still available. Persons interested in obtaining a garden plot in Alton Baker Park may contact the County Parks office in the basement of the Public Service Building, 125 East Eighth Avenue.

With the probability of a dry summer, parks staff representatives encourage gardeners to consider attending one of the Lane Extension Service gardening programs. The programs, to be conducted by Duane Hatch, will emphasize gardening by using water conservation methods. Several sessions are scheduled at the Extension Service auditorium.

The two-hour sessions will be held Thursday at 7:30 p.m., April 15 at 1:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. and April 19 at 9:30 a.m.

1990 plan open to scrutiny

Two meetings to explain the process which will be used to update the Eugene-Springfield Area 1990 General Plan have been scheduled by the Lane Council of Governments.

The first meeting is set for tonight from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. at Harris Hall in the Lane County Courthouse, 125 E. Eighth Ave. The second meeting will be held Thursday night, same time and location.

The 1990 General Plan was adopted in 1972 to serve as a guide for the physical development of Eugene, Springfield and the adjacent unincorporated areas of Lane County. The plan includes a provision calling for a major re-evaluation and update of the plan after five years to ensure its responsiveness to changing community conditions.

Citizens can suggest priority issues and make comments or suggestions on how the plan is to be updated at the meetings. A short summary of the issues identified so far is available from local planning departments and libraries.

Bowhunt training offered

A six-week course in bowhunter education is being offered by the Eugene Parks and Recreation Department. The course covers a variety of topics including stalking, tracking, safety, survival and camouflage.

The class meets from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday and April 12, 19 and 26, May 3 and 10 at Jefferson Junior High, 1650 W. 22nd Ave.

Attendance is required at all of the classes to receive certification from the National Field Archery Association. Cost is \$2.
