Profs receive awards

Three University professors have received fellowship awards from the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation.

Chemistry professor Hayes Griffith received the award for studies he is conducting on the structure and function of biological membranes. History professor Jerzy Linderski received an award for his work with Roman electoral assemblies and physics professor Brian Matthews received a Guggenheim award for his studies in molecular biology.

Nationally, 313 scholars, scientists and artists received fellowship awards totaling approximately \$4,602,000.

IRS urges early filing

Oregonians who file their tax returns at the last minute may have to wait longer than expected for a refund unless they double check their returns for errors, Ralph Short, Internal Revenue Service district director for Oregon, said.

The chance for error is greater this year because of recent tax law changes including the taxable income credit, child care expenses, disability pay, income received during retirement and business use of a home.

Short pointed out that last-minute filers tend to make more errors than those who file earlier in the year and that these taxpayer errors frequently delay processing of returns at IRS Service Centers until the mistakes can be resolved.

In double checking their returns, taxpayers should look for such common errors as incorrect arithmetic, use of the wrong line of column in the tax table, incorrect address or social security numbers or failure to sign the return, Short said.

Taxpayers filing at the last minute also can minimize delays in receiving refunds by making sure they place the pre-addressed label at the top of their return and mail their return to the IRS in the coded envelope provided with their tax package.
