Life workshops planned

A Life Planning Workshop designed for adults over 25 who are experiencing job dissatisfaction, life changes such as divorce or death or anyone who wants to increase life satisfaction is being offered at the University Saturday and Sunday, April 16 and 17.

The workshop's initial two-day session will be followed by 13 days in which the participants will spend at least one hour a day on self-assigned tasks. The workshop concludes with a third full-day session on Saturday, April 30.

Life planning, according to workshop leaders, is the expansion of career development into areas of life beyond job concerns, including leisure, relationships and self-development. John Loughary, associate dean of the College of Education, and Theresa Ripley, coordinator of career planning at the University, are workshop leaders. They note the purpose of life planning is to enhance self-direction and increase life satisfaction.

The workshop fee is \$40 per person, plus \$5 for materials. Two units of academic credit are available for an additional \$26. The sessions will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day at the Division of Developmental Studies, 1761 Alder St.

Stress to be examined

Ideas for coping with the stresses of the 1970s based on the thinking of Alfred Adler will be shared with participants at the annual conference of the Oregon Society of Individual Psychology (OSIP) meeting April 29 and 30 at Eugene's Valley River Inn.

Eva Ferguson, psychology professor at Southern Illinois University, and John Taylor, psy-

chologist in private practice in Salem, will lead sessions related to the conference theme "Adler and the Challenge of the Seventies."

Ferguson, daughter of Adlerian thinker Rudolf Dreikurs, will address the broad social, cultural and political issues facing people in the 1970s and how to deal with them. Taylor, well known for his work with family problems, will discuss Adlerian principles for harmonious family living.

The following are a few of the volunteers needed by Lane County agencies. The list is compiled by the Voluntary Action Center (VAC), 673 West 10th Ave.

- Community friends: to work with and be a friend to people with mental/emotional problems. Training will be provided.

- Horseback riding assistants: help supervise small group of children while you enjoy a ride. One hour a week is needed.

- Stamp club leader: be a club leader for a group of fourth through sixth graders after school.

- Information volunteer: gather information from local agencies about volunteer programs and services. This is telephone work.

- Personal tutor/aide: several persons needed to assist handicapped children in physical education and in development of writing skills.

- Walking companion: walk with and be a friend to a blind person in need of companionship.

- Play group aide: assist supervisor of elementary after-school care center.

- Organizers: provide assistance to charitable organization in developing fundraising ideas and in other publicity-related areas.
