Famed author to lecture

Former National Book Award winner John Barth will deliver a Henry Failing lecture at the University Wednesday.

The lecture will feature readings from the author's work and will be presented at 8 p.m. in 150 Geology. Admission is free and the public is invited to attend.

Barth is a respected author-educator. Currently professor of English and creative writing at The Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, he received the National Book Award in fiction in 1973.

His works include the best seller "Chimera," published in 1972, "Lost in the Funhouse," 1968; "Giles Goat-Boy," 1966; "The Sot-Weed Factor," 1960; "The End of the Road," 1958; and "The Floating Opera," 1956.

Before joining the Johns Hopkins faculty in 1973, he served on the faculties at Pennsylvania State University and at the State University of New York, Buffalo.

His lecture appearance is being supported through a bequest made to the University in memory of Henry Failing, a Portland banker who served as an early president of the University's board of directors. The Failing lecture series has brought prominent artists and scholars to the University campus since 1949.
