Nora Ephron here Monday

Media commentator Nora Ephron, a senior editor at Esquire Magazine, will deliver the 1977 Ruhl Lecture at the University Monday.

The lecture, sponsored by the journalism school and made possible by a grant to the school from Mrs. Robert Ruhl, widow of the late publisher of the Medford Mail-Tribune, will be held in the

EMU beginning at 8 p.m.

Admission is free and the public is invited to attend.

Ephron will speak on professional ethics within the American mass media. The Esquire editor writes a monthly column entitled, "The Media," in which she comments on the profession's ethics, strengths and weaknesses.

A Californian, Ephron began her journalistic career at the New York Post after graduating from Wellesly College. She left the Post after five years and worked as a free-lance writer, selling articles to Good Housekeeping, Cosmopolitan and the New York Times Book Review.

She joined Esquire in 1972. Her columns on women quickly became a highly popular feature of the magazine. After a year at New York magazine, she returned to Esquire in 1974 to begin her present column. She is married to Washington Post reporter Carl Bernstein.

Blood pressure screening today

Screening for high blood pressure will be available at the Lane Community College Downtown Center, 1059 Willamette St., today in recognition of The Heart Association's High Blood Pressure Month in May.

The LCC Student Health Service "Apple Booth" will be at the Downtown Center from 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. to provide the free testing. Laura Oswalt, director of the student health service, and a volunteer registered nurse will perform the test with an electronic blood pressure measuring device.

The Heart Association recommends periodic blood pressure checks as a screening for those unaware that they have high blood pressure, a reminder to those aware of the condition to continue their medication or contact their physicians, and to emphasize that treatment is available and heart damage can be controlled with proper medication.
