Economist lectures today

Professor Gordon Tullock of the Virginia Polytechnic Institute will deliver a lecture on the topic of revealing demands for publicly supplied goods in a democracy at 3:30 p.m., Monday, May 23 in room 189 PLC.

Tullock is one of the pioneers in the theme of public choice. The topic of demand revelation is a fundamental one in public choice and one for which a solution is an intricate topic. Tullock's best known work is "The Calculus of Consent" written with James Buchanan. He also published "The Politics of Bureaucracy," "Toward a Mathematics of Politics," "The Logic of the Law," "Private Wants," "Public Means" and many journal articles.

Tullock studied law at the University of Chicago and earned his Ph.D. in economics at the University of Virginia.

We, the undersigned Faculty and Staff of the University of Oregon support the student referendum to be held Monday and Tuesday, May 23 and 24, 1977 on the question of University ties to white minority governments in southern Africa.

We urge students to vote and vote YES on the following questions:

1. Recruiters from corporations with investments in South Africa (Azania), Rhodesia (Zimbabwe) or Southwest Africa (Namibia) should not be permitted to use University of Oregon facilities for recruitment purposes, since these corporations are propping up and profiting from the system of apartheid and white minority rule.

2. The State Board of Higher Education and the University of Oregon Development Fund should divest themselves of all stock and other holdings in corporations with investments in South Africa (Azania), Rhodesia (Zimbabwe) or Southwest Africa (Namibia).
