Dubin, who lives in Veneta, is currently specializing in two kinds of woven tapestries of natural colors in wool, jute, linen, cotton and unspun fleece. The first type are solid poly-chromatic landscapes and designs from nature. The second are light and airy, open weaves that create special intervals of space. Both are featured in the display in the Congressional district office.

Dubin, who grew up in Eugene, studied drawing and painting for several years at the Maude I. Kerns Art Center and then for three years in the University's art department.

Recent shows of Dubin's weavings include the Bird's Eye View Gallery at Lido, Calif., University of California at Irvine and the 1976 Craftsmanship Show in Eugene.

Presently Dubin is conducting weaving and crocheting classes in Eugene and has been regularly selling her pieces at the Fifth Street Public Market since September, 1976.

'Old timers' highlight show

An exhibit showing the evolution of man's timetelling systems will be featured at the Southwest Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (SWOMSI) from Wednesday through Friday, June 24.

"A Walk Through Time," developed by the Commerce Department's National Bureau of Standards (NBS), consists of colorful panels and artifacts tracing man's first measurement of time by use of the Sun and the Moon through to today's sophisticated division of time into millionths of seconds.

Time-keeping by the Egyptians, the Mayan Toltec and the Aztec cultures, the Babylonians, the ancient Greeks and Chinese is depicted. Also, medieval and modern mechanical clock time-keeping through to the present day are displayed. The artifacts are a miniature obelisk, a hand-carried shado-clock as used by the early Egyptians and an ancient water clock.

NBS has broadcast continuous time and frequency signals since 1923.

The display can be seen at SWOMSI's new location at 480 Shelley St., Springfield. Admission is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students (4-17) and senior citizens. Children under four and SWOMSI members are admitted free. This fee admits one to all museum exhibits that day and to the planetarium.

Handicapped session set

Parents of handicapped children will be able to learn about new federal and state laws which insure a handicapped child's right to an education during a one-day public workshop Saturday at the University.

Sponsored by the Exceptional Family Advocacy Center at the University's Center for Human Development, the day-long program will focus on "Law and the Handicapped Child."

"The program will be geared specifically for parents," explains coordinator Paulette Lavrar. "Speakers will include parents of handicapped children and professionals who work directly with the handicapped."

All workshop activities will be held in the Clinical Services Building. Sessions begin at 8:30 a.m. and will include lectures, small group and panel discussions.

Among speakers will be Charlotte Des Jardines, coordinator, Council for Handicapped Children, Chicago; Mason McQuiston, state coordinator for handicapped, State of Oregon; Margaret Nichols, director of educational services, District 4J, Eugene; Jerry McGee, director, Fairview State Home and Training Center; Jennie Ray, coordinator, Preschool Multiply Handicapped Program, Douglas County IED; and Bud Fredericks, Oregon College of Education.

All parents of physically and mentally handicapped children are invited to attend. Registration is \$2 per person and may be completed by contacting the Exceptional Family Advocacy Center, Clinical Services Building.

Book examines poetess

A glimpse into the lives of many leading writers, artists, diplomats and intellectuals of the 20th Century is included in University English professor George Wickes' biography of American millionairess Natalie Clifford Barney, whose Paris house was a popular Left Bank gathering spot for more than 60 years.

In "The Amazon of Letters," published by G.P. Putnam's Sons of New York, Wickes examines the life of the wealthy poetess and writer from her birth in Dayton, Ohio, in 1876 to her death in Paris in 1972 at the age of 95.

Almost unknown in the United States, Natalie Barney was — and is — a legendary figure in France.

Regular visitors at her Paris house included James Joyce, Gertrude Stein, Andre Gide, Janet Flanner, Mata Hari, Paul Valery, Jean Cocteau, Bernard Berenson and Ezra Pound.

However, Barney is perhaps best known in Europe as a sort of "female Don Juan" whose life combined Victorian elegance with liberties of the modern age. Wickes touches on many of her elaborate courtships and seductions of famous women.

Also included in the biography is a section of interviews, articles and excerpts from memoirs which provides additional insights into Barney's life through the eyes of her contemporaries.
