

Girls' summer sports open

Registration for the girls' segment of the University's Summer Sports program for area youths will remain open throughout the summer, according to Cindi Lantz, registrar for the girls' sports program.

The boys' segment of the program, however, has been closed, with some 185 Eugene-Springfield boys scheduled to participate, she said.

The Summer Sports program, conducted as a community service by the University's health, physical education and recreation college since 1953, is open to boys 8 to 13 years old and girls ages 6 to 13 who live in the Eugene-Springfield area.

The girls' segment offers three hours of planned morning activity, Monday through Friday. Activities include swimming, gymnastics, track and field, games, rhythms and folk dance for younger groups, and soccer, basketball and archery for older groups.

Both boys' and girls' segments will run from June 20 through Aug. 5. Registration costs \$85.

Blacks in film subject of talk, class lectures

William Gaddis, a writer and TV producer for Bell Laboratories, will speak on the "Images of Blacks in American Film" Thursday at 9 p.m. in 177 Lawrence. Gaddis will show the film "Nothing But a Man" at 7 p.m. as part of the program.

Gaddis worked for five years as an independent filmmaker before joining Bell Laboratories to produce documentaries, science and informational films. He was a writer and producer-director for a variety of New York-based shows for national telecast over the Public Broadcasting System, including several episodes of Bill Moyer's "Journal" and a 90-minute special entitled "The Black Composer." In 1973, Gaddis was the associate producer of "The Me Nobody Knows," a TV adaptation of the Broadway musical.

Gaddis' appearance is being sponsored by the Cultural Forum, and the ethnic studies and film studies departments. Gaddis is also speaking to several film studies and black drama and literature classes during his three-day stay on campus.

Thursday's program is open to the public.

Registration information, a sample test and a list of test centers and testing dates for the Law School Admission Test will be available in the law school's Admissions Office in 201 Law after August 1.

The Law School Admission Test is required for admission to most American law schools. The tests will be given at centers in the United States Oct. 8 and Dec. 3, 1977, and Feb. 4, and April 15 and July 15, 1978. The test is administered by the Educational Testing Service under the policy direction of the Law School Admission Council.

The half-day objective test is given in the morning. It is designed to measure certain mental abilities deemed important in the study of law.

The law school's admissions office has copies of the Law School Admission Bulletin and Study Guide available to prospective law students, as well as registration forms for the test. Interested persons can either stop by the admissions office or write directly to Law School Admission Services, Box 944, Princeton, N.J. 08540, after July 1.

Prof earns Rome Prize

Donald Peting, assistant department head and associate professor of architecture at the University, has been awarded a 1977-78 Rome Prize Fellowship in environmental design by the American Academy in Rome.

The award is worth about \$10,000 in allowances, living quarters and monthly stipends. It will allow Peting and his family to live one year at the academy and do independent study of Mediterranean windmills and watermills. He is one of only 26 Rome Prize winners for 1977-78.

Peting graduated from the University of Illinois at Urbana in 1962 and received his masters of architectural design degree from the University of California at Berkeley in 1963. He has been a University faculty member since 1963.

Two students gain awards in math area

Two University seniors have been awarded the University's DeCou Prize in mathematics. The prize is presented annually for excellence in mathematics and provides a \$250 award.


The 1977 winners are Michael Boehnke of Eugene and George Filz of Portland. Both are mathematics majors.

The DeCou Prize is named in memory of the late Edgar DeCou, who served as a University mathematics professor from 1902 to 1944 and was the first chair of the University's mathematics department.
