

Oregon Hall: Land of offices with answers

If the State System of Higher Education, the University administration, the ASUO or the IFC can't answer your questions, it's a good bet one of the many services of Oregon Hall can. Included in the building on the corner of 13th Avenue and Agate Street are the following:

PAYROLL — The business office takes care of student payroll transactions in Room 122, ext. 3151.

ACCOUNTING — Centralized billing for student charges are handled in this part of the office.

Deferred tuition schedules, billing and collection of all loans, service charges, fines, general deposits, housing deposits and student insurance needs are centralized in Room 113, ext. 3169.

CASHIERS — All money transactions are processed at the cashier windows. They receive payments for deferred tuition, dorm rooms and married student housing, as well as regular fees and tuition. They also handle veterans checks and certificates of registration. The cashiers are located on the first floor, ext. 3154.

REGISTRARS — The registrar's office prepares schedules of classes and packets for each student during registration, and supplies information on non-matriculant programs. Transcripts of student academic records and degree analyses can also be obtained here, as can veterans information. The registrars are located on the second floor, ext. 3247.

ADMISSIONS — Information on admission requirements for both undergraduates and graduates, course placement recommenda-

tions and residency classification are acquired here. Students must also file a change of major in the admissions office, Room 270, ext. 3201.

STUDENT FINANCIAL AID — This office offers counseling and information of all types of financial aid, including loans, work-study programs, grants and scholarships. The student employment office is also located in Room 270 of the Financial Aid office, ext. 3221.

THE UNIVERSITY IDENTIFICATION CARD SERVICE — Identification cards for students,

faculty, staff and University town patrons can be snapped up in Room 364, ext. 3113.

THE STUDENT CONDUCT OFFICE — Situated on the fourth floor, ext. 3210, this office formulates and evaluates student conduct policies and procedures. It supplies information on student court minor problems, administers the University Appeals Board and handles code violations.

If, after all these avenues have been exhausted, you still can't find the answer, try the information booth in the first floor lobby, ext. 3014.

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at least through July, because the board does not have any guidelines until the Legislature adjourns.

These "decisions" the State Board awaits are on topics including capital construction costs for the member schools of the state system, tuition changes, money for compliance with new Title IX regulations calling for equal treatment of women and men in athletics, student evaluation of faculty and a child care bill.

The State Board of Higher Education is made up of 11

members, all currently Oregonians serving six-year terms. Their decisions affect the nine members of the state system: Oregon State University, Portland State University, Oregon Technical Institute, University of Oregon, University of Oregon Medical School, University of Oregon Dental School, Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon State College, and Eastern Oregon College.

The board, given authority by the Legislature, meets once every three months at one of the

campuses in the state system. All board meetings are open to the public, except when the members decide to hold an executive session, which by law is closed to the public.

The board is divided into two different sections. Five members of the board serve on the Academic Affairs Committee and five others serve on the Finance and Business Affairs Committee. There is also an executive committee — made up of the board president and vice-president plus chairmen of three other committees — which acts in emergency matters if the whole board cannot reach a decision.

Student input into the board's decisions is aided by two student members, as well as in testimony by members of the Oregon Student Lobby, the ASUO and other student associations.

Roy Lieuallen, Chancellor of the Oregon State System of Higher Education, is responsible for implementation of the board's decisions and plans. He directs the presentation of all business and other matters to be considered by the board at its meetings.

Lieuallen is assisted by John Richardson, as well as five vice-chancellors: Miles Romney, vice-chancellor for academic affairs; Holmer; Rex Krueger, vice-chancellor for educational systems; Jack Hunderup, vice-chancellor for facilities planning; and W.T. Lemman Jr., vice-chancellor for personnel administration.

IFC task narrows to 'emergencies' only

When the Incidental Fee Committee (IFC) sits down at the beginning of the summer, it's usually "a little here and a little there" as the committee tries to make a few left-over dollars last to the beginning of the funding year.

Paul Bartel, acting IFC chair for the summer, explains that the committee's main work this term will be to hear supplementary requests from programs. "We mainly try to handle emergency situations only, we don't let our summer work become an extension of the budgeting process," he says.

The IFC is composed of seven students and is charged with deciding how some \$1,436,450 in student funds will be divided among various campus programs. Funding levels for programs for the 1977-78 academic year were determined last spring in marathon budget hearings which lasted five hours a day, seven days a week during a three-week period. Some 70 programs are funded by student incidental fees.

The budget the IFC came up with, which includes \$784,000 for the EMU, \$221,900 for Intercollegiate Athletics, \$215,000 for ASUO programs and \$91,087 for ASUO governing bodies as major expenses, is scheduled to become effective July 1.

Bartel says summer offers an ideal time for new program directors to iron out budget problems and to get to know the IFC members and their budgeting processes. IFC members have lighter workloads and are usually more available for individual help during the summer. "People should feel free to drop by," says Bartel. "We'll have office hours posted after classes begin." IFC sessions will be held two afternoons a month.

IFC members this summer include Steve Schmunk, Dave Tyler, Steve Herlocker, Doug Benson, Layne Gray, Jeff Warren and Bartel. The terms of office of Bartel, Schmunk and Gray will be over this fall and elections for their spots will be held in October, according to Bartel.

The IFC office is located in Suite 5 of the EMU, ext. 3720.

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
