Oregon State American Athletic Union (AAU) Age Group Track and Field Championships will be held at Hayward Field beginning at 10 a.m. Saturday. Age groups will include all nine and under, 10 to 11, 12 to 13, 14 and 15-year-old boys and girls. Age is

determined as of December 31, 1976.

Some 750 competitors are expected from all over Oregon and southern Washington. Among them will be many nationally ranked youngsters including several national record holders for their age groups.
