under 60, described an almost Christian "born again" feeling on her first UFO sighting at Giant Rock, Ariz. "It was large — enormous. It was all sorts of colors, but mostly gold," remembers Wolff. "I felt it land both outside and on the inside."

Aluti Francesca, a guest at the convention and head of the "Solar Light Retreat" in Portland, claimed to have regular communication with space people.

Several years ago, Francesca's "space brothers" led her to discover regression techniques. These techniques, she claims, help her bring back memories of former lives, in both herself and her subjects. (See related story on Page 5).

Other and younger members of the convention brought together the mechanical and spiritual as-

pects of the group. "We can take pictures of love," said 23 year-old Charles Tomaras. "Kirlian photography records the light or aura of the body, and we can photograph a change in this aura. For example, when people think of Christ the light around their fingers grows and reaches out."

Though the five under-thirty members of the convention expressed a strong conviction in extraterrestrial life, they also admit fanaticism can sometimes take hold in believers. "Last year we were at a skywatch gathered in a circle doing an 'Ommmm' chant and looking up at the sky," remembers David Owen. "Then this guy comes along and says 'They've landed,' and we all freaked out. An old guy started screaming out 'X-15,' 'X-15!' It was hilarious."

Each of the convention attendees was drawn to the convention directly or indirectly by Aho, a former major in the Army. Aho, a rather saggy man with large watery eyes, baggy pants and a soft but arresting voice, claims to be a descendant of the prophet Ezekiel.

Aho claims to have made several sightings himself. He says he stopped counting at 20. During his first sighting, on the Mojave Desert in 1957, he was left with the transcendental message "Your civilization is on a precipice and only the spiritually motivated people can guide your civilization through the days ahead."

Aho's response to this message was the creation of the New Age Foundation, which he says prepares its members to enter the "New

Age, the New World." The organization has since grown to own centers in Portland, Sun Valley and recently the lodge at Mt. Rainier. "I received a cosmic message to buy this place," he said of the several cottages and the lodge outside Mt. Rainier Park. "It will be a place for all to come, especially the young, from Eugene and further south, to learn of the New Age."

Aho believes the government has been tricking the people. "There is conclusive evidence to show that the planets are hollow," he says. But more important than his views on the extra-terrestrial is his philosophy of life, which seems somehow connected to the UFOs. "We in the new age are not afraid of truth," said Aho. The salad dishes clinked in the background. "We have come

here to say 'I like you as you are' to our brothers, to say 'tomorrow you can be better.'"

No flying saucers were seen at the convention, but no one seemed to mind. As the attendees began pulling out on Saturday, Aho moved among the cars. "Keep your eyes to the skies," he said laughing.

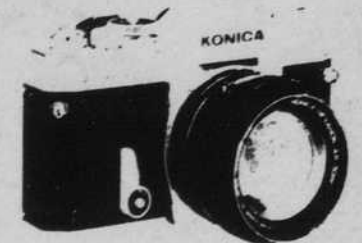
