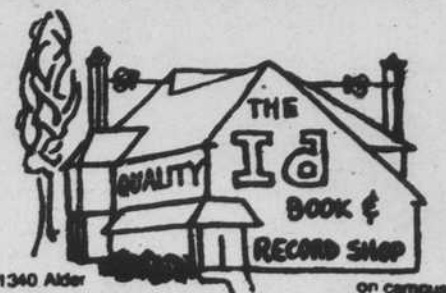

\$10,000 grants awarded profs for cancer study

Two scientists at the University have received postdoctoral research fellowships from the American Cancer Society for genetics research.

Biologists John McCullough and George Sprague Jr. have received fellowships worth \$10,950 a year. McCullough's award is for one year and Sprague's is for two.

The scientists' work will focus on how genetic traits are selectively expressed in common bakers yeast, single-celled organisms with the complex structural make-up of cells in higher organisms.

The selective expression of genes in yeast cells may be similar to the phenomenon which allows human cells containing identical genetic coding to split off and do different jobs in the body: one cell working in the liver, another working in the brain.

The American Cancer Society is interested in such research because of the possible relationship of uncontrolled cell growth — cancer — and faulty gene expression.

McCullough and Sprague will join a University team led by biologist Ira Herskowitz which is conducting an on-going study of how genetic information is controlled at the molecular level.

Fires banned in Spencer park

Surreal images to display

At 7:30 tonight, Maude I. Kerns Art Center will host a reception for Richard Quigley, who will show paintings and drawings at the Center. He received his B.F.A. degree from Cornish School of Allied Arts in Seattle, and has shown in Seattle, at the Bellevue Annual, and Artists of Oregon, 1977, at the Portland Art Museum.

Originally a pre-medical student involved in technical drawing, Quigley began studying painting in 1970; and the landscapes of Mexico and Hawaii as well as the Pacific Northwest have influenced his visual images. His interest in science, mythology and anthropology have combined with his imagination and technical skill with paint, to produce evocative and surreal images. Quigley says, "Technique is the story there, not content... be cognizant of that as you see my escapes."

The show will continue through July 31. Gallery hours are: Monday through Friday, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, 1 to 5 p.m. All gallery shows are free.

Summer session workshops on the ERIC (Educational Resource Information Center) data base will be offered Wednesday and Friday. ERIC, the most extensively used computer-searchable data base in the social sciences, offers computer and print access to citations to over 275,000 articles and documents. These articles and documents are of interest to students and faculty in education and such related fields as linguistics, physical education, child development, and environmental education.

The workshops will introduce the ERIC system and cover the principles of manual and computer searching. The Wednesday session will be held in Studio A of the library Audiovisual Center from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. The Friday session will be held from 9 to 11 a.m. in Studio C. The sessions are free, but advanced registration is required as the size of the sessions is limited.
