

## Swimming found unsafe

Pollution levels found in the University footbridge area of the Willamette make that spot unsafe for swimming, according to a list compiled by the Lane County Environmental Health Division.

Other sections of the Willamette listed as unsafe include the area downstream from Island Park and the Coast Fork in Cottage Grove.

Rated safe were areas at Jasper Park, Black Canyon, Green Waters Peak, Sand Prairie and the confluence of the Coast and Middle Forks.

Except where it is joined by the Lower Coast Fork and Salmon, Lost and Hills creeks, the Middle Fork of the Willamette drew a general "okay." Most reservoirs and lakes were listed as safe except for Orchard Point at Fern Ridge and Triangle Lake, which are "questionable."

Alton Baker Park's lagoon is alright except after heavy rains, the list said, but Amazon Creek, the millraces, and the Q Street floodway are not.

Other areas listed as safe include the Mohawk above Marcola (but not below); the McKenzie, except just below Camp Creek; the Siuslaw to three miles above Mapleton; the Blue Star rest area; and Blue Pool on Salt Creek.

## Professor wins new post

Warren Brown, head of the department of management at the University, has been appointed as the new associate dean of the University's School of Graduate Studies.

Dean Aaron Novick said Brown, who begins his new post immediately, will be responsible for administering academic regulations and interdisciplinary programs within the school.

The appointment is a three year term. Brown, 44, replaces Esther Jacobson-Leong, who is returning to full time faculty duties in the art history department after serving three years as an associate dean.

The new associate dean has been a member of the University faculty since 1967. A former faculty member at Indiana and Northwestern universities, he holds his B.S. degree from the University of Colorado, M.S. from Stanford University and his Ph.D. from Carnegie Institute of Technology.

## Grad students must file now for fall quarter

All summer graduate school students who intend to register fall term must file an Intent to Re-enroll form by August 1. It must be approved by your major department or school and be filed with the graduate school. Submission of the form is essential to insure a registration packet for fall 1977. ## Faculty take appointments

University professor Robert Mazo has been selected director of the National Science Foundation's (NSF) Chemical Thermodynamics Program, headquartered in Washington, D.C.

NSF's Division of Chemistry has announced that Mazo will serve as director of the national research program for one year, starting in September, as part of a continuing effort to augment permanent staff with non-career ad-

ministrators from the academic community.

As a program director, Mazo will be responsible for reviewing research proposals and administering NSF grants to scientists throughout the United States.

Mazo, 46, who joined the University faculty in 1962, served as director of the UO's Institute of Scientific and Scholarly Research from 1964 until 1967 and as associate dean of the Graduate School from 1967 until 1971.

Richard Maxwell Brown, professor of history at the College of William and Mary, Williamsburg, Va., has been appointed to the Beekman Professorship of Northwest and Pacific History at the University.

The announcement was made last week by Robert Lang, acting head of the history department.

The Beekman Chair has been vacant since Earl Pomeroy, professor emeritus, retired from the University in 1976.

The new Beekman professor was awarded his B.A. in political science from Reed College in 1952. Brown earned his M.A. and Ph.D. in history at Harvard University, specializing in American history.

He taught at Rutgers University from 1960 to 1967 and has been a professor of history at the College of William and Mary since 1967.

## Law professor gets federal aid to create course

A University law professor has received federal aid to help him design a course for first-year law students which would serve as a "bridge" between undergraduate and legal education.

The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded \$10,000 to Herbert Titus as summer planning support. Titus will offer the new course to University law school students during fall term.

Titus said the course, called "Perspectives of the Law," will be an attempt to help students learn to use their legal knowledge within a larger framework which includes knowledge in other areas.

## Accreditation reaffirmed

The Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges has reaffirmed its full accreditation of the University.

James Bemis, executive director of the Association, made official notification to the University.

Institutional accreditation, Bemis noted, is not given for a definite period of years and must be reaffirmed periodically.

Normally colleges and universities are visited at least once every 10 years for an on-site reaccreditation study.

In April, a reaccreditation team visited the University.

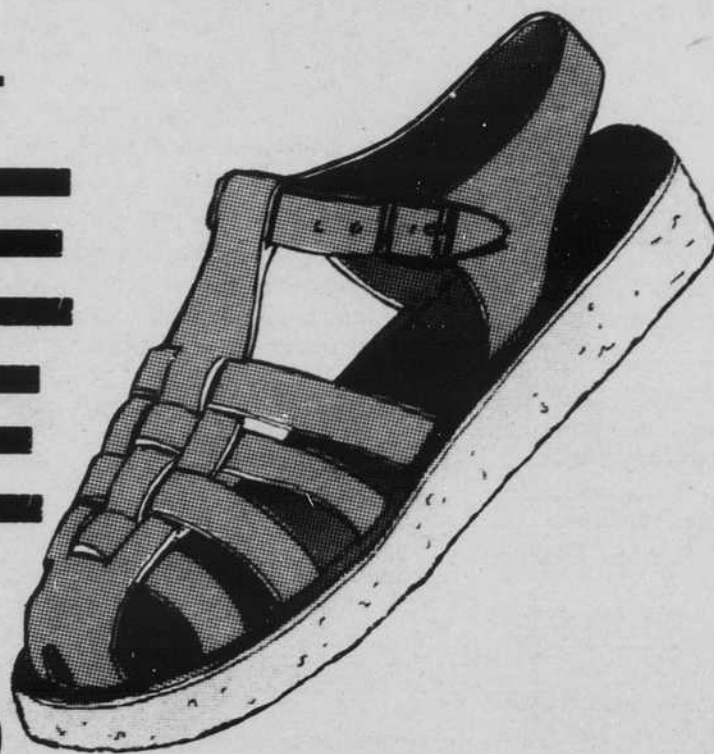
