

Volunteers needed for fall

The four-day orientation program will include meetings, a welcome dinner, discussions and informal tours of the campus and town.

Sacred Heart to expand

Western Oregon Health Systems Agency, the health planning body responsible to review health proposals in the twelve Western Oregon Counties, has announced a public meeting to gather public comment on planned expenditures by Sacred Heart General Hospital.

Sacred Heart proposes to relocate and expand the Hemodialysis Unit at a cost of

\$341,310, to relocate and add new equipment to the Special Procedures Room at a cost of \$485,800, and to renovate the Progressive Cardiac Unit at a cost of \$189,700.

The public meeting, sponsored by the Subarea Advisory Council of Lane County, will be held tonight at 7:30 p.m. at the Citizens Bank Building, 975 Oak, Room 640.

Owl study area, bird count circle topics of meeting

A meeting to establish a spotted owl study and research area and Christmas bird count circle will be held Wednesday beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) district office at 12th Avenue and Pearl Street.

The study area and count circle will be centered on the historical community of Alma, located along the Siuslaw River 25 miles southwest of Eugene. At least a half-dozen pairs of spotted owls are to be found within the Alma research area.

The spotted owl inhabits and depends on old-growth timber stands that are rapidly undergoing conversion (logging) to younger stands of forest. The BLM has set aside 5,000 acres on its Eugene district lands to provide "crucial habitat" for the owl.

The meeting is sponsored by the Southern Willamette Ornithological Club with the cooperation of the BLM district office.

Course printouts ready

The University registrar is requesting that students pick up a computer copy of their class schedules in the second floor of Oregon Hall from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Alcoholism class offered

Beginning today, "Alcoholism and Treatment," a University Search course, will be combined with the Community Alcohol Education series for a four-week period. The series is open to the public and for credit as a one-hour course, either undergraduate or graduate, by registering at the University (HE 400, TLN 6950). The course is organized by the Lane County Council on Alcoholism and sponsored by the University Health Education department.

Classes will begin at 7:30 p.m. and last until about 10. Credit students will be required to attend a film series yet to be scheduled. The course will cover the following topics:

- July 19 — Physiological effects of alcohol consumption; alcohol and nutrition; underlying psychological mechanisms of alcoholism.
- July 26 — History and progression of alcoholism in the individual; effects on family friends; youth and alcohol — present state of the problem.
- Aug. 2 — Treatment philosophy and systems; different facilities and modalities of treatment.
- Aug. 9 — Primary prevention among young people; community responsibility and public education.

Commissioners approve budget

The Lane County Board of Commissioners approved an \$86.9 million budget Wednesday for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1977.

There will be no need for a levy election because the tax increase required is below the allowable 6 per cent increase limit.

The budget will be completed this fall when revenues from timber sources and federal and state grants will be known.

Of the approved budget, 37 per cent will be allocated for services to county residents, 26 per cent to environmental services, 19 per cent for law enforcement and judicial services, and 18 per cent for general governmental and management services.

The vote was 2-1, with Commissioner Archie Weinstein dissenting.

At the budget meeting Tuesday night, Weinstein expressed the opinion that the County's operating budget should be limited to last year's level. He proposed that an election be held to give the voters a chance to express their feelings about the new operating level.

Commissioners Jerry Rust and Bob Wood rejected Weinstein's proposal.


