

**Workshops explore new interests**

The series "Monday Night Affair at the Library" will continue Monday at 7:30 p.m. with a talk on "Native American Views Toward Art" by Mel Blanchard.

The talk is one in a succession of free introductory workshops intended to give people a chance to explore new areas of interest without having to commit themselves to a long, expensive series of classes. Persons attending will be able to meet artists and craftspersons and share some craft secrets, or learn to solve emotional and business problems. They can also see dance performances, hear music, or investigate intellectual pursuits such as ideas of life after life, child psychology, or new UFO investigations.
