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Prof awarded fellowship

Angela Jung-Palandri, professor of Chinese and Japanese at the University, has been awarded a Fulbright-Hays faculty research fellowship for the 1977-78 academic year.

Starting in mid-September, Palandri will spend nine months in Taiwan and Hong Kong interviewing and conducting research about women authors in contemporary Nationalist China and Hong Kong.

Palandri is herself the author of two books "Modern Verse from Taiwan" and "Sun and Moon," a collection of poems by two Chinese poets.

In September her third book, "Yuan Chen," a critical study of the Ninth Century poet, will be published by the C.K. Hall Company of Boston.

A native of mainland China, Palandri is a graduate of Catholic University of Peking. In addition, she holds a master of arts degree and a master of library science degree and a Ph.D. from the University of Washington.

She has served on the University faculty since 1954, except for a period from 1956 until 1962 when she held several librarianship positions in the Midwest.

Center names new head

Richard McKillop has been named the new Education Director at Willamette Science and Technology Center (formerly SWOMSI). He replaces Gary Bond, who resigned earlier this month to pursue business interests.

McKillop, 43, will have administrative control over the department's activities, including the Community Outreach Program, after school program and special events.

He served as both instructor and administrator for the Division of Continuing Education, Structuring Emergency Planning for County and City Emergency Services. In addition, he has instructed Adult Education Classes at Lane Community College.

County opens applications for committees

Lane County's board of commissioners are accepting applications from county residents for a variety of advisory committees.

Committees that have openings are:

- Budget Committee, one opening.
- Parks and Open Space Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC), six openings.
- Safety and Accident Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC), three openings.
- Environmental Sanitation Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC), 12 openings.

Powers of the budget committee include limiting the amount of tax which may be levied by a taxing district and establishing a tentative maximum for total county expenditures. The committee reviews and approves the Lane County budget for each fiscal year.

Appointments to the budget committee are for three years. Persons interested in serving should have knowledge and interest in county programs. A fiscal management background is desirable.

The 11-member Parks and Open Space CAC deals with present and future park development, operational and maintenance policies and relationships with federal, state and private park agencies.

The environmental sanitation CAC studies existing and potential sanitation problems related to the environment of Lane County and suggests solutions to the problems.

Applications must be submitted by Aug. 8. Application forms for each of the committees are available from the Lane County Community Relations Office, 687-4207.
