Meteor activity to brighten up August nights

Clear skies permitting, August will be the best month this year for observing meteor activity, according to Steve Davidson, Willamette Science and Technology Center's Planetarium director.

Three separate meteor showers may be visible during the month, he says.

The most active of these — also the biggest of the year — is the Perseid shower. It will reach its maximum intensity between Wednesday and Sunday, with the peak of activity occurring early Friday morning.

Celestial conditions are excel-

lent this year since moonlight will not interfere with perception, Davidson says, and up to 60 meteors an hour might be counted at that time.

The Perseids, a constellation which appears in the northeast at nightfall and then arcs across the sky to the west, intersect with the earth's trajectory every August. The shower becomes visible as the pebble-sized objects burn in the earth's atmosphere.

Optimum viewing conditions exist between midnight and 3 a.m. each night, according to Davidson. By that time the shower has moved from a position on the northeast horizon up to directly overhead. Davidson advises viewers to watch the shower from a dark place, away from the glow of city lights. The shower is easily seen with the naked eye.

The Kappa Cygnids meteor shower will be visible from Wednesday through August 20. It is characterized by fewer but more brilliant fireballs. The shower appears to emanate from Cygnus, which looks like a faint cross in the northwestern sky.

Finally, Davidson calls attention to a suspected new annual shower. It was first noted during the Perseid shower, and if visible, will emanate from Pegasus, low in the eastern horizon at sunset. Those interested in helping confirm the shower's existence may phone Davidson at the center, 726-6666.

Freud's work focus of confab here this fall

The life and work of Sigmund Freud will be the focus of a symposium at the University this fall which will feature a presentation by child analyst Edith Buxbaum, who in the 1930s studied child analysis with Freud's daughter, Anna, in Vienna.

The Freud Symposium, scheduled for October 21 and 22, will be the third session in the Pathfinders in Human Personality Series, sponsored by the University's Division of Developmental Studies.

Each year the series celebrates the life and work of a person who has made "original and lasting" contributions to psychology. Past symposia have featured the work of Carl Jung and Alfred Adler.

Buxbaum, who maintains a private practice in Seattle, is the author of "Your Child Makes Sense" and "Troubled Child in a Troubled World."

Jazz festival set in Colorado

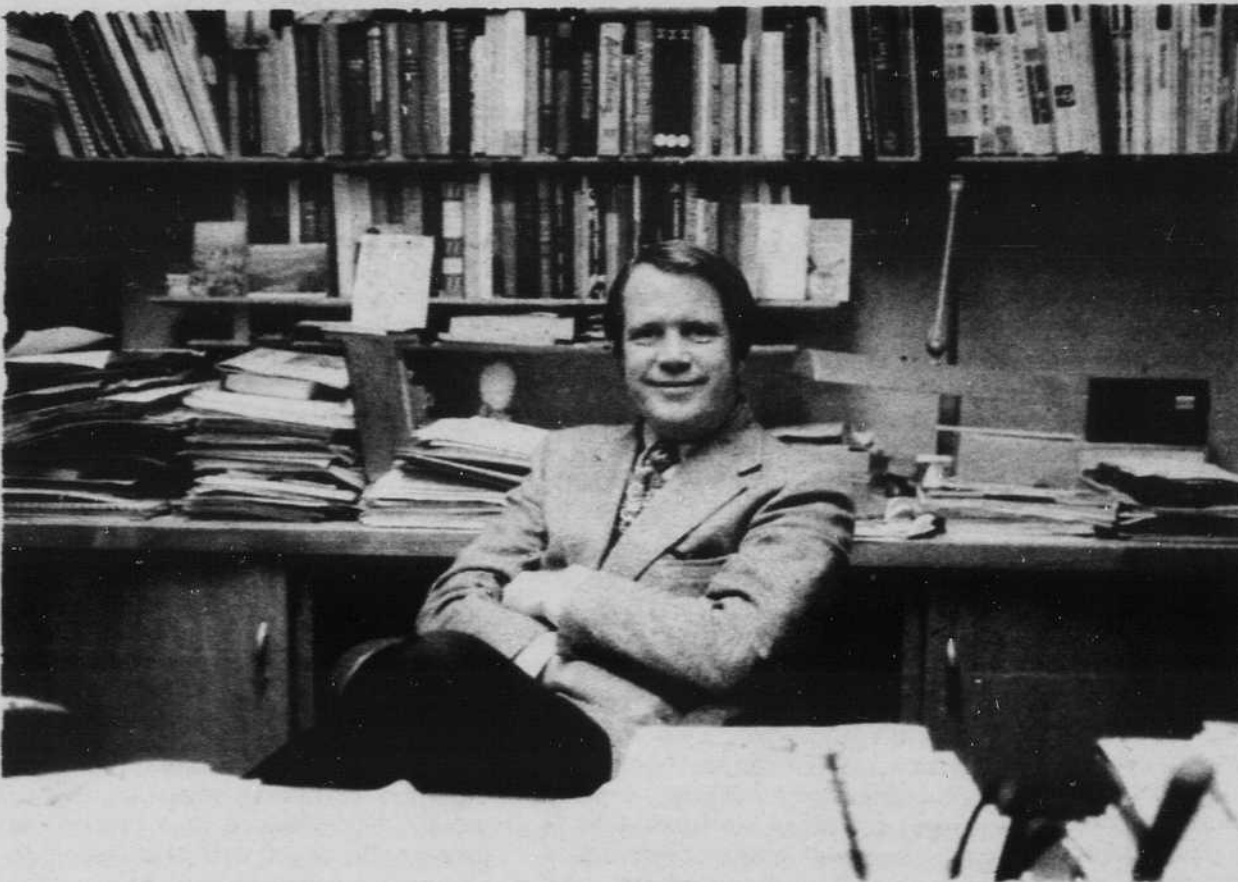
