

Biggs Consort to perform

The John Biggs Consort, a group specializing in music from the Middle Ages to the contemporary era, will perform at Beall Concert Hall Tuesday at 8 p.m.

The Consort is an international Renaissance ensemble formed by John Biggs, whose introduction to music began at age seven when he received a violin scholarship to the National Institute of Music and Art in Los Angeles.

Biggs has a private collection of authentic reproductions of early instruments such as krumphorns, recorders and hand-bells. Many of these instruments are played by Biggs during performances.

The Consort performed at the San Diego and Ashland Shakespearean festivals and the Renaissance Pleasure Faires in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

General admission is \$2, and student tickets are \$1.
