

Last day for grad list set

The list of degree candidates for fall term graduation is now being compiled by the Office of the Registrar. The last day to file an application for degree to be granted fall term is Oct. 14. This date will be enforced because of the many operations of checking, clearing and printing which must follow.

To qualify for a degree, a student must complete all necessary work and procedures by the term's end. All transcripts from other schools necessary for a degree should be sent to the attention of Graduation, Office of the Registrar, in order to be on file by Dec. 23. This includes work taken through the Division of Continuing Education.

Any student who has applied previously and did not receive the degree must reapply. Likewise, any student who does not meet the deadlines must reapply for a future date.

Mail offices mark holiday

The Eugene area post offices will be closed Monday in observance of Columbus Day.

All service windows will be closed; however, mail will be available for pick up from post office lock boxes at the main office and all stations. There will be no carrier delivery other than special delivery and express mail.

The tenth anniversary of the University Center for Gerontology will feature a speech by Jim Weaver, fourth district congressman.
