

'Y' offers scuba course

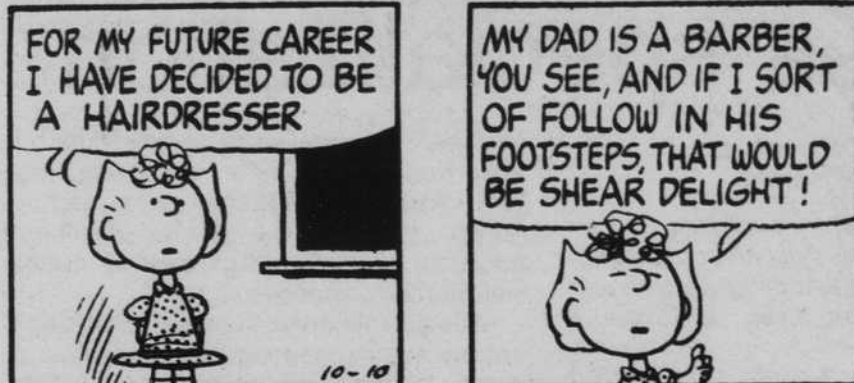

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Mexico program now offered to UO students

Mexico has now been introduced into the Oregon State System of Higher Education study abroad curriculum for University students. Approximately six weeks of intensive Spanish language and an "Introduction to Mexico" seminar will begin the program in Guadalajara in early January.

The Mexico program is equivalent to two terms of study and will allow students to make normal progress toward their degrees. All participants must have a minimum of 24 quarter hours of Spanish and sophomore standing to qualify for the program.

Designer Fuller to speak

R. Buckminster Fuller, often referred to as the paramount innovator of alternative technology, will speak at the Lane County Civic Center Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. The author, architect, engineer and ecologist will lecture on the World Games Symposium and the Design Science Primer.

Fuller is credited with several inventions and designs. His best known might be the geodesic dome, a structure that provides the greatest strength for the least volume of weight.

According to "Contemporary Authors," his works are innovative, useful and so original that Fuller himself describes them as "dymaxion," a combination of "dynamic" and "maximum efficiency." Dymaxion inventions include a three-wheeled vehicle called the Dymaxion Car, which can reach speeds of 120 miles per hour and turn a full circle within its own length, and the Dymaxion House, an inexpensive, circular structure that is prefabricated and collapsible.

Fuller's philosophy that man must adapt his technology to work with his physical universe is revealed in all his architectural work and writings.

He is the author of numerous books including his recent works, "Synergetics," a study of the comprehensive mathematical system employed by nature and "Transformation Trends," a look into the future at how the world could become.

Limited seating is available for the lecture, which will include a question and answer period. Tickets can be purchased in advance for \$3.25 or at the door for \$4 at the Lane County Civic Center, 13th Avenue and Madison Street.
