CC workshop planned

A two-day workshop for Oregon community college personnel will be held in Portland Oct. 18 and 19. Its main goal is to inform people about community education growth in Oregon.

The Northwest Educational Development Center at the University is conducting the workshop through a \$16,500 Oregon Department of Education grant.

"The basic goal is to increase peoples' awareness of the many aspects of community education and to foster their interest in the needs of the community," says Larry Horyna, director of the Northwest Center. He also says emphasis will be placed on helping students develop skills to help the community in service areas.

"Community education," Horyna says, "is a process where local communities can determine their own priorities and how they can meet those needs through their assets."

The grant will also support the work of graduate students who will be assigned to the workshop to provide special experience and expertise in community school programming.
