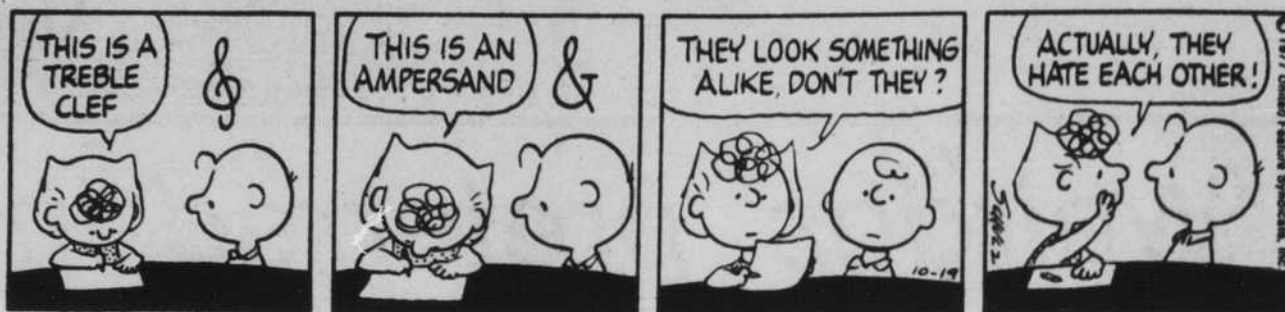
ERA planned topic for meeting
