

S. African investments deliberated

A State Board of Higher Education ad hoc committee will make recommendations to its finance committee regarding South African divestitures Friday at Portland State University (PSU).

The finance committee will then accept, reject or modify the recommendations before sending them to the full board next month for a final decision.

The entire board will also meet at PSU Friday. Members will discuss preparation of a budget for the 1979-81 biennium.

Divestiture would require the board to withdraw its stock from corporations dealing with the white minority government in South Africa.

Freeman Holmer, state board vice-chancellor for administration, will present a report to the finance committee on corporate involvement in South Africa.

Holmer has sent letters to the 84 corporations in which the board has invested. He says he has received replies from about 64. Over half have some connection with South Africa, Holmer says, but the degree of involvement varies widely.

"AT&T, for instance, say they have no employees or investments there, but they send telephone communications to and from there as part of their international service system," Holmer says. "Phil-

lip Morris is involved in that they sell cigarettes there. A lot of the corporations' involvement is pretty minor."

Holmer says that almost uniformly 1 per cent or less of the corporations' wealth is earned from South African sources. Exceptions to this rule are Dresser Industries with 2.6 per cent and John Deere with less than 2 per cent of their wealth coming from South Africa.

Holmer has also received a letter from U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young regarding U.S. investments and their effects on the condition of South African blacks.

Overall, Holmer was pleased with the response of those corporations the board polled.

"I was pleased by the detail those corporations were willing to provide us," he said. "It would appear that the corporations do well in integrating better work facilities, increasing the number of blacks in supervisory positions and starting extensive training programs in

South Africa."

Apparently, the money invested in these corporations comes from mixed funds available to the entire state system. These are used for scholarship funds in all public colleges and universities. The fund is invested for the state by professional managers.

Some of that money is invested in corporations that have activities in South Africa, so every institution in the state system is a beneficiary of the funds invested in South Africa.

The Revolutionary Student Brigade (RSB) plans to present concerns about the subject to the board.

RSB claims the board is feeding apartheid by investing in these corporations.

The finance committee meeting will be held at 8:30 a.m. Friday in Room 338 in the Michael J. Smith Memorial Center on the PSU campus.

The entire board will meet in the same room at 10:30 a.m.
