

Eigen delivers lecture

A former Nobel prize winner and German chemist will deliver a Henry Failing lecture at the University Tuesday.

Professor Manfred Eigen, director of the Max Planck Institute for Biophysical Chemistry, Göttingen, Germany, will deliver a public address at 8 p.m. in Room 150, Geology. His talk on the "Origin of Biological Information," will be open without charge to the public.

An authority in the study of high speed chemical reactions, Eigen shared the 1967 Nobel Prize in chemistry and physics for his pioneering research.

His lecture appearance is being supported through a bequest made to the University in memory of Henry Failing, a Portland banker who served as an early president of the University's board of directors. The Failing lecture series has brought prominent artists and scholars to the campus since 1949.

Health class rescheduled

A series of classes to help parents learn how to promote and maintain their own and their children's health has been rescheduled for Tuesday.

The classes will be from 10 to 11:30 a.m. at St. Mary's Episcopal Church at 13th Avenue and Pearl Street. There is no charge and no preregistration.

The eight classes will deal with how to recognize an illness, what to do about illness, how to take a person's temperature and know what it means, and how to appropriately use a doctor.

The classes will be conducted by Lane County Health Division nurses.

Bozarth-Campbell is originally from Portland, but she has set up ministry in Minneapolis.

This Security Council is the first mock U.N. activity on campus this year. The University will host a mock United Nations General Assembly in April, 1978.

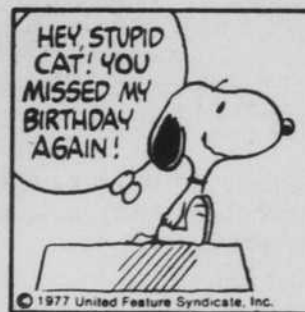
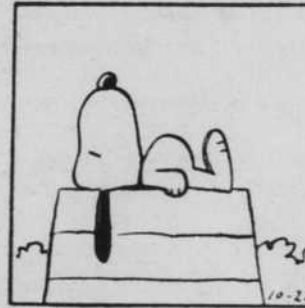
Outdoor Program meets
