

Concert to help benefit whales set Wednesday

Since whales and dolphins communicate by sound, the Oregonians Cooperating to Protect Whales say they are excited to focus on their characteristics via the presentation of fine music.

A special concert at Beall Concert Hall Wednesday night at 8 will feature the Panocha String Quartet from Prague, Czechoslovakia.

Funds from the concert will be used to finance improvements at the downtown office for the Oregonians Cooperating to Protect Whales and to support educational programs on behalf of the "Save the Whales" campaign.

The Panocha was ranked among the world's great chamber ensembles by critics when the quartet debuted in Eugene in the fall of 1975.

Scarcely out of their teens, the four members of the quartet have been playing together for over six years. They have played more than 200 concerts in Eastern Europe and have recently finished a six-week summer residence at the Yale University School of Music.

Tickets will go on sale Wednesday at the Sun Shop, Everybody's Records, the EMU Main Desk, and the whale office at 873 Wilamette St. Student prices are \$3

Ex-english prof set to lecture on popular culture

A scholar of classical English who has become the chairer of the nation's only academic department of "pop culture" will deliver a guest talk Wednesday at the University.

Ray Grown, professor at Bowling Green (Ohio) State University, will speak on "Icons and Heroes of American Culture" at 12:30 p.m. in 167 EMU.

His talk is sponsored by the Cultural Forum and is open and free to the public.

Browne is a former English teacher who left the ranks of traditional study in English to teach "pop culture." In his classes at Bowling Green, Browne uses resources from the \$500,000 pop culture library to lecture on contemporary fads and personalities.

Old Italian folk songs slated in prof's recital

Seniors urged to interview for jobs early, often

University students who plan to graduate any time during the current academic year should begin scheduling on-campus employment interviews now, advises Neil Murray, director of Career Planning and Placement.

"Now is the time for scheduling interviews and talking to recruiters," Murray says. "We already have about 75 recruiters who will be visiting the campus fall term and the number grows regularly."

Murray says many firms like to make contact with prospective graduates early in the academic year. The early contact allows firms to build recruiting lists and to make follow-up contacts with prospective employees.

Recruiters representing a broad variety of firms will visit the campus this year, Murray says.

"So far we've seen opportunities for students in accounting and business, but we've seen a lot

of opportunity for arts and science graduates too."

To schedule on-campus interviews with recruiters, students need only sign up for appointments in the Career Planning & Placement Service office, 246 Susan Campbell Hall.

Scheduled recruiting visits are posted in the office one week in advance. "All students have to do is to come in and sign up," Murray says. "Postings are made every Wednesday for the following week."

"It's helpful," he says, "to prepare a resume and prepare a placement file."

Leaf pick-up, delivery crews start this week

City Maintenance crews begin leaf pick-up from Eugene city streets this week.

Ken Hatch, Eugene's maintenance engineer, says leaf pickup will be made only on streets with curbs and gutters and no shrubs or tree trimmings will be collected.
