

County to buy local art

Lane County artists and craftspeople will be able to tour the county's Public Service Building before submitting work in a purchase competition of art work to be placed in that building.

Tours will be held Thursday and again Nov. 3, starting from the Harris Hall lobby, 125 E. 8th Ave., at 10 a.m. The committee urges interested persons to view the actual spaces being considered for art work.

Work to be considered will be mostly that of Lane County artists. Criteria for selection will include appropriateness of art work related to placement location, quality of design and craftsmanship, durability of materials and clarity of proposal.

The Arts Advisory Committee is receptive to a wide variety of media content, including photography, painting, sculpture, poetry, tapestry, lithography, banners and prints. Groupings of works are acceptable, as well as joint entries by more than one person.

Entries will be accepted from Jan. 3 to 13. They may be in any medium elected by the artist. Entries should specify the proposed placement location, price of the art work, method of mounting and a brief biographical resume of the artist.

Computer site tour planned

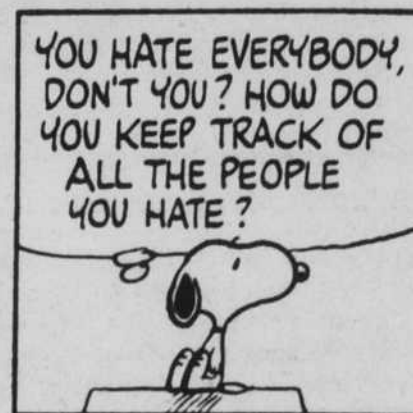
This week's Tours du Jours sponsored by University Relations, will be a tour of the Computing Center, according to Fred Mohr, assistant to the vice provost for academic planning.
